

Death of a Hero, by Richard Aldington, Gordon & Gotch, Ltd., Toronto, 388 pages, \$2.50. A few days before Armistice in the Great War, Captain George Winterbourne, of the British Army, stands up suddenly and unnecessarily to a hail of machine gun bullets and is instartly killed. Did he or did he not commit suicide? It it was suicide, what was the reason? Mr. Aldington has written a novel on the problem of this officer's death. He divides the book into three parts, and also a prologue, which latter describes the indifference the news of the warrior's death was received at home. Part one deals with Winterbourne's parents and grandparents, old English families of the Victorian nineties. Part two, Winterbourne struggling as an artist amongst the affectations of the Intelligensia and against British apathy, also two women who play a major part in his life. Part 3, a picture of the war-gruesome and realistic as ever a war book was, perhaps a little too frank, but a story that one will remember. The book is the first noel by this young Englishman, Richard Aldington, who is a poet, scholar-He writes with a musical sweep and fluency that carries you through the book entranced.
