The Passing of William McNaulty

This week it falls to our lot to report the death of a well-known man in this locality, this being William McNaulty, in his 78th year. Mr McNaulty left his home on lot 1, con 15, Proton, and drove with horse and buggy on Thursday morning, to see his brother John, who has been very sick for some time. Shortly after reaching there, he was taken very sick and the Doctor called. But death was in the cup and he passed out on Friday afternoon.

"Billy" McNaulty was born in Scotland and came to Proton when about 15 years of age, along with his widowed mother, one sister Henrietta and two brothers, John and Robert. They settled on lot 19 con 16, Proton, and for those over sixty years, Billy McNaulty has been a respected citizen of the locality. He was for many years a hired man. No weather was too bad and no day was too long. Although he was often poor in purse, he was never heard to complain and always rich in the respect and confidence of all who knew him. His word was good on all occasions.

Over 50 years ago he married Joan McAulay of Birdell and to them were born seven sons and two daughters. The daughters are Jennie, Mrs Charles Euphrasia; Susie, Mrs Charles White, Proton; the sons, Thos., of Euphrasia; Daniel, who sleeps in Flanders' Fields; Robt J. and Chas., near Swinton Park; Joseph, of Dromore; Albert, who died here 17 years ago and Andrew, who being deaf and dumb, has been the great care of mother and father. Mrs McNaulty died on Feb. 12th last, aged 76. Mr. McNaulty, May 12th, just three months after, in his 78th year. Billy McNaulty left not only to his family, but to all who knew him, an example which we all could follow with profit, of honesty, industry and truthfulness one who never cried depression. He also left two farms, lots 3 and 19, con 19, Proton, with we learn, provision for his needy son, Andrew.

The funeral was held on Sunday, from the home to the Latter Day Saint church, where service was conducted by Elder Taylor of Grand Valley. Undertaker, G. Watson, Priceville, was in charge. Interment was made on the hillside there beside his wife and son. The pall bearers were six nephews: Roy McNaulty, Proton; Geo. Brown, St Vincent; Alfred, Geo. and Howard Hutchison, Euphrasia, and Thos Knott, Euphrasia. Two brothers survive, John, of Proton and Robert of B. C.
