## THE ROLL CALL

FRANCES SOPHIA MOCKLER

Death, it might be said, has come as a happy release to the frail tenement of Miss Frances Sophia Mockler, who died Tuesday evening, June 13, at her home in Upper Town, Durham. While always of a delicate constitution, the last few years, largely due to age, had left her in somewhat of an invalid condition and a stroke of paralysis hastened the end. Since last February, she has been practically bedfast and throughout these many days and long months, her constant nurse and companion was her niece, Miss Edith Chadwick, who has been most unremitting in care and attention bestowed upon her aunt.

The death of Miss Mockler removes an historical figure from civic life of Durham. She was born in England, 86 years ago, the daughter of the late William Herbert Mockler and Ann Atkinson. She crossed the Atlantic for Canada, with her parents at seven years of age, living for a time in Fergus and Weston. They removed to Durham 78 years ago occupying for a short time the home occupied by Peter Hepburn, until the well-known cottage was built and where she has resided continuously for seventy years. In conjunction with her sister, the late Miss Maria, deceased for some years conducted a private tutoring or training school for young children in town at that time, deceased especially developing the art of fine needlework. Possessed of a retentive memory and an interest for everything that went on around her, Miss Mockler was a delightful lady to converse with and much of the history and romance of early Durham is lost by her passing. Refined and cultured in her outlook on life, it was with regret that such souls should leave us. Miss Mockler was a life-long member of the Anglican Church and its ritual and traditions were very dear to her.

She was the last of her family leaving two sisters and a brother predeceasing her: Miss Maria, who died 15 years ago; Sybilla, (Mrs Chadwick), 46 years ago and Herbert William, deceased 27 years.

The funeral service will be held from Trinity Church, Thursday, at 2.30 p. m., interment taking place in Trinity Church cemetery.

**MRS ELIZABETH McDONNELL**  
The sad news reached Dr. J. F. Grant on Monday of the death of his aunt Mrs Elizabeth McDonnell, in Dundas, Ontario, on Sunday, June 11. The deceased lady was the oldest sister of the late Mrs C. L. Grant and Archibald Davidson, and was over eighty five years of age.

Her maiden name was Elizabeth Davidson and her early girlhood days were spent in Durham. She was married to Duncan McDonnell, a lawyer here, who was reeve of Durham in the early 70's, the second reeve Durham ever had. Her husband died a few years later, leaving her with seven of a family, all now deceased except one daughter, Mrs Hugh Hatch, (Margaret) of Dundas, Florida, with whom Mrs McDonnell resided.

The family removed from Durham to Palmerston over fifty years ago, thence moved to Detroit where they resided for many years. In recent years she has been in Florida.

The remains will be brought to Durham for interment in Durham cemetery, beside those of her late husband. Funeral service will be held on Monday, June 19th, at 2 p. m. at the home of Dr J. F. Grant.

Slaght, barrister, of Toronto, also an able platform man, who spoke here a few years ago.

Though no political campaign is on hand, it is not many months distant, and all citizens regardless of politics should avail themselves of the opportunity of hearing these distinguished speakers discuss the problems of the present time.

Bishop Seager preached the sermon, a thoughtful and timely discourse on grace and love, taking his text from Gal. 13: 14.
