## All Day Trial at Division Court Friday

Only one case was before Judge Morley at Division Court sittings here last Friday,—that of Robert Bell Engine and Thresher Co. of Seaford vs. Robert W. Morrison.

It was well there was no others on the docket, for this action took from 10 a.m. until nearly 10 p.m. before and of the twelve men subpoenaed, the five selected were John T. Brown, Egremont, foreman; Geo. Allen, Glenelg; Jas. Blyth, Normanby; John Bailey, Bentinck; and Louis Armstrong, Durham.

The action was entered by the Bell Engine and Thresher Co. in Seaford court and transferred to Durham, in which jurisdiction defendant Morrison resides. Acting for the plaintiffs was Barrister Meir of Seaford, while Mr Morrison's counsel was Barrister Roy Robertson of Walkerton.

Morrison had purchased a second-hand threshing separator in August 1930 from the plaintiff Company for two \$250 notes and his old machine, but finding after delivery, that the separator was not in good running order, as promised, he signed and paid only one \$250 note. In July 1931, he visited Seaford, got some of missing equipment, and paid \$45 on it. He had spent a great deal of time trying to make separator work with cutter attached, work properly, and had lost over \$500 business in 1931, on account of its defective working in fall of 1930. The Company added interest on note, but throw off all in excess of \$200 owing, and sued Morrison for that amount in the Division Court, while Morrison entered a counter claim for damages for loss of business.

Witnesses for plaintiff, were Earl Bell, Vice-Pres. and Manager of the Bell Co.; E. H. Epps, truck driver, who delivered the machine, and Wm. Golding, M. P., for South Huron, who is foreman of the Bell Machine Shop. Defendant's witnesses were himself, Angus Smith of Mount Forest, foreman of Ernst Bros. foundry and a number of South Egremont and Normanby farmers, who all testified to their dissatisfaction with the work of Morrison's machine in threshing for them—Lish and West Halliday, Geo. Ammerman Orrie and Geo. Hunt, Henry Cowan, Albert Owens, Alex McQuarrie, Albert Cameron. Most of them declined to re-engage Morrison the next year.

When witnesses had all been heard both counsels and the judge addressed the jury and Judge Morley submitted five questions for verdict of jury. Was machine delivered according to terms of agreement? Was it fit for purpose intended at time of delivery? If not, what allowance should be made on balance of \$250? Has deft. suffered damages? If so, give particulars and amount of damages? After over an hour sitting the jury returned a 4 to 1 verdict on 4, and 3 to 2 split on 1 question. They found machine not as agreed, and not in good shape for use, made allowance of \$20 and recommended \$75 damages. His Honor Judge Morley reserved final judgment as to costs, but after close, the parties got together and agreed on settlement. Deft. pays plaintiff \$105 in full of claim and pays all his own and local court costs, while plaintiff pays their own costs and those of Seaford court.

## THE ROLL CALL

KATE McDUGALL

Like a swift meteor passing in the night, might the death of Miss Kate McDougall be characterized, who passed away at her home on Queen St. at 2 a.m., Tuesday, in her 64th year. Making his home with her was Mr. Andrew Hay. Mr Hay states that Miss McDougall had shown no previous symptoms of illness,—in fact had felt unusually well that day and spent two hours in her garden Monday morning. About 10:30 Monday evening, Mr Hay heard a strange call from Miss McDougall's room, where she had retired for the night. Hurrying to her side, he found her in the throes of a stroke of paralysis. The patient immediately became unconscious and her right side was heavily paralyzed. Medical aid was summoned but nothing could be done, and she lingered until 2 a.m.

For most of her life, Miss McDougall has been a resident of Durham. Born in Pricville, the daughter of the late Colin and Mrs McDougall, the family eventually moved to Durham and here has been her home for the past 45 years. Her father predeceased her in 1918 and her mother three years ago.

Deceased was of a quiet and retiring nature but those privileged with her friendship found her a true and steadfast bulwark in times of sorrow and distress. She was a devoted member of the Baptist Church, and always in her pew when health permitted. The McDougall home was always known for its hospitality, both Mrs McDougall and her daughter being excellent housekeepers and home-makers.

Of a family of seven children born to Mr and Mrs McDougall, three yet survive, viz: Archie and Allan of Toronto; and Mrs (Rev.) Boone of St. Louis, Mo. Deceased members are Mrs John McLean, Mrs Ben Townsend, Mrs Fiddes and brother John. Mrs Boone and two brothers are here for the funeral, Thursday, also two nieces, Mrs Minion of Toronto, and Mrs Austin Baldwin, of Owen Sound. Mr Arch McArthur, Pricville, a cousin of deceased, with his wife, were also present Thursday.

## MRS ALEX RUTHERFORD

After several weeks suffering and illness borne with Christian fortitude Death might be said to have come as a happy release to Mrs Alex Rutherford, who passed away about 9 a.m. Wednesday, June 28, at the home of her sister, Mrs N. McKechnie in Durham. Nine months ago deceased's husband answered the last call and their only son James is now bereft of his mother in her last illness. At time of Mr Rutherford's death, members of the family knew she was not well, though she was always able to be around. She sold her property and household contents and six weeks ago came to live with her sister. She gradually became weaker and for the last four weeks has been bedfast.

Previous to her marriage, Mrs Rutherford was Janet Jack, daughter of the late Richard Jack and was born in Wellington, N.Y., near the shores of the St. Lawrence. With her parents she moved to Toronto. After her marriage to Mr. Rutherford, they lived for a few years in Toronto. 28 years ago they came to Durham and here has since been their home.

The late Mrs Rutherford was respected as neighbor and friend and many kindly memories linger over her kindly acts and manner. Had she lived to 29th July, she would have attained her 72nd year. Also mourning with the son, are three sisters, Mrs McKechnie, Durham; Mrs H. Williams, Edge Hill; Mrs J. Cushnie, Toronto; and two brothers, Sam, of Winnipeg, a visitor to the East at present and William at Zion. The funeral takes place Friday afternoon from the residence of Mrs. McKechnie, at 2 p.m. Interment in Durham cemetery, services to be conducted by deceased's pastor Rev. W. H. Smith, of Knox Church.

### Co. Treasurer Parker Retires

Grey County Council, in session last week at Owen Sound, decided against any paving on Provincial Highways within the county this year and reduced the tax rate from 9 to 7 1/2 mills. E. D. Bonnell, assistant Co. Treasurer, was appointed Treasurer. Succeeding Mr John Parker, at a salary of \$1700 per year. Mr Parker, whose health is not good, is retained in an advisory capacity at \$700 a year, making a saving of \$200 annually in the two salaries paid.

## Durham Decisively Defcates Alliston in 1st Play-offs

Durham 12, Alliston 5, was the result of the first playoff here Tuesday night to decide District No. 2 of the Tri-County Box Lacrosse League. Durham had finished in first place and Alliston in second. The second game is in Alliston Thursday night and goals count on the round. Seven goals should be a safe margin for Durham. The winner will meet either Huntsville or Orillia, who play off in No 1 group.

The game may be described as "fast and furious" and about the best and liveliest ever staged here. Close, hard-checking predominated, and at times the game almost got away from referees Coates and S. Burgoyne of Orillia, who as it was, imposed 29 penalties during the game—16 to Durham and 13 to Alliston. 3 of Durham's were given to players running inside the goal crease minus the ball. With such heavy checking, several injuries were inflicted. E. McDonald suffered a gash below left eye requiring medical aid; Sherwood Rowe's foot was jumped on by an opponent, giving him a broken ankle, and his services were lost the balance of season; Jack Lauder got a slash across wrist; and Preston of Alliston who had been out of game with a broken hand, had another finger broken in falling against boards, laying him off again for the season. Preston is counted a star, and he scored the first two goals of game.
