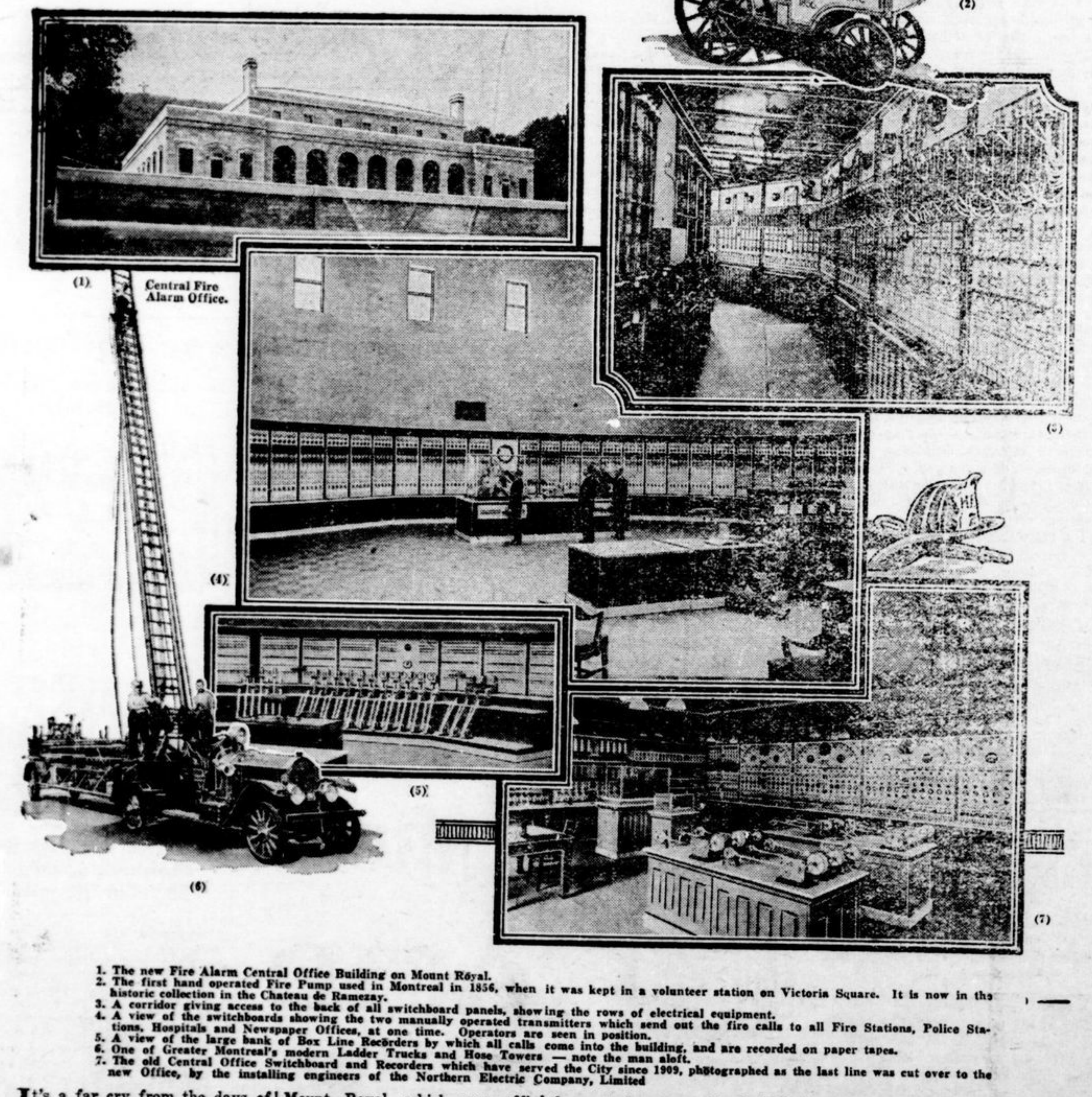

## World's Largest Fire Alarm System Inaugurated

It's a far cry from the days of the volunteer hand pump and bucket brigade of 1850, to the fire fighting equipment of today, and the contrast is nowhere better illustrated than in this group of pictures of Montreal's new Fire Alarm Central Station, situated on the northeastern slope of Mount Royal, which was officially opened by His Worship, Mayor Rinfret, on June 29th, when the new central office took over the supervision of all fire calls and the old board was reported "Dead" after twenty-four years' service. Owing to the phenomenal growth of the city in the past few years the facilities of this old board have been outgrown.

This two million dollar project has taken over two years to complete. It now holds a unique position in the fire fighting circles of the Empire, and indeed of the world, since it is the largest Central Fire Alarm Station to be found anywhere in the world.

It is designed not alone for today, but very wisely provision is made for expansion, with a view to the day when the whole island will constitute Greater Montreal.
