## Splendid Fair at Priceville

### IDEAL WEATHER CONDITIONS

Held in ideal summer weather last Friday, a little larger crowd than usual attended Priceville Agricultural Society's fall fair and were rewarded by viewing excellent exhibits, both inside the hall and out. Exhibits in the Hall were not as plentiful as in some years, but there were sufficient to provide keen competition, especially in the ladies' work and baking classes. There were nine entries in 5 lb roll butter for the Eaton Co. prize, an 8-day modern easel clock won by Charles Watson. His brother Campbell Watson was fortunate to capture the R. Simpson Co. prize of a beautiful silver tea service, for best 5 head of grade cattle. Many good specimens of horse flesh were on display, Victor Adams, W. Meads, H. McLeod, T. H. Wilson, A. Rob McQuig, T. H. Thibodeau and Harrison Bros. being the principal prize-winners. Arch McQuig won the special for best horse on grounds. For single driver and lady driver, T. H. Wilson and Victor Adams won 1st and 2nd. Those L. Mercer, Marie, was judge.

In cattle classes, Shorthorn, Jersey, Hereford and Galloway, were contested. Harold Karstaedt and Dan Campbell had Durhams and the former and Walter Ferguson the Jerseys. Henry Eckhardt & Sons captured all but one of the prizes with his Hereford herd and Walter Ferguson, D. Campbell, J. McGirr, Wm. Mather, Camp, Watson, A. J. McVie and W. Mead divided up the grade prizes. G. E. Foster, Honeywood, was judge.

John McGirr's Leicester sheep swept that class. No others were shown. In swine, Alf Wepler also ruled supreme, sweeping Bacon Hog and York Classes. Campbell Watson was the only other exhibitor and prize-winner. C. E. Herrington, Durham, judged the poultry, in which class exhibits were more numerous.
