Even Dick didn't know in so many words himself what he had decided to do. The power of suggestion works in riddles. But his mind had a plan drawn that would keep him occupied day and night from now on.  
"Dick! Dick! Where are you? Get Harold and do an errand for me, will you? Oh, there you are. It's only down to the store. What's the matter? Sitting sick?"  
"I guess not. I'll go. I don't just feel very well, that's all." Dick got up off the swing like an old, old man and reached listlessly for the money.  
"Heavens, Dick, if you take sick now your mother will never forgive me."  
Child's Mind Works  
Dick looked dimly at the petunias, although this was all cheering news. He likes his Aunt Frances well enough but he wasn't crazy about this idea of his mother and father going off on a vacation and leaving him at home with her.  
"Aunt Fran, maybe a little ice-cream would cool me off and make me feel better."  
"Yes, do get some. Here's some more money. You didn't eat your lunch and I can't have you starving."  
Dick walked slowly over toward Harold's, but when he got out of sight he ran.  
Now what followed may seem to be far beyond the ken of a child of nine, but that is just because we don't guess how children's minds often work.

Richest Farm Manure  
Poultry manure is undoubtedly the richest produced on the farm. Poultry manure, however, ferments very quickly, losing, if left exposed, a large proportion of its nitrogen as ammonia. This fact, the Dominion Chemical points out, emphasizes the desirability of cleaning off the boards beneath the roosts, a plan that also conduces to the general good health and thrift of the fowls.  
In summer, the manure, previously cleaned off, should be dried and stickiness and facilitate distribution. It may be applied directly to the land and worked with the surface soil—its best preservative. In winter (and at other seasons when the manure cannot be used directly) it should be mixed with a fair proportion of loam, dried peat, loam, plaster or superphosphate to fix the nitrogen. It should then be packed tightly in barrels or boxes and stored protected from rain until required in the spring. Lime and wood ashes should not be used for this purpose as they set free nitrogen. Poultry manure being essentially nitrogenous is particularly valuable for garden and leafy crops generally, and the majority of poultry keepers will no doubt do well to reserve it for this use. However, if the amount available permits, it can be profitably employed for the cereals, grasses, roots and corn.

English Radio Exhibition Reports Good Business  
London.—During the first four days of the radio exhibition held here at Olympia, orders totalling nearly £12,000,000 were signed—£3,000,000 worth by overseas buyers.  
This is a 50 per cent. increase over last year. At the present rate this year's exhibition will break all records for the British radio industry.

Sales of Motor Vehicles Show Increase in July  
Ottawa.—The total number of new passenger cars, truck and buses sold in Canada in July last was 5,140 with a retail value of \$5,045,231, as compared with 4,017, valued at \$3,729,211 in the corresponding month of 1932, says a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.  
New passenger cars sold totalled 4,569, valued at \$4,492,645 in July last, as against 3,473, valued at \$3,261,756, in July, 1932, and the trucks and buses 552,586, as against 547,455 in the same month of last year.

Told in Brief

Salt-water gnats, the smallest known flying insects, caused the descent of a giant American bombing plane by choking the screen filters of the carburetors.  
Agriculture is still declining in Gt. Britain; 75,000 farm workers have left the land since 1923, and 45,000 fewer acres were actually under crops in 1932, as compared with 1931.  
Beauty parlours for children are appearing in the West End of London (England). Here girls of nine can have their eyebrows plucked, their nails tinted, and their hair permanently waved.

Six of the British films already made this year have cost at least £50,000 each to make, the most expensive being "Bitter Sweet" and "The Private Life of Henry VIII," which cost £75,000 apiece.  
British film producers are so handicapped by lack of suitable women "stars" that American principals, who are unemployed through the shortage of leading male actors, are here in search of work.  
Three German villages have asked permission to become one town with the name of "Hitlersberge," in honour of "the endowments of the present Government to help the suffering industrial area."

Rabbits can be dangerous. In Lille, France, one of these animals, which suddenly turned rabid, killed ten fowls and three ducks, in addition to biting a man, his wife, and three children, a dog, and two cats.  
Sport is to take second place to home duties among German girls, by order of the "Nazl" Sport Director who says that women must only be allowed to take part in sport so long as their health is not endangered.  
Plastic materials are revolutionizing industry. The first cost of the mould is the greatest expense; afterwards the cost of manufacture is small, it being almost as cheap to turn out a hundred thousand articles as one, after the mould is made.

Crime statistics are misleading in one respect. They do not differentiate between large and small offences. Out of 59,267 persons found guilty of indictable offences in 1931, the great majority had committed comparatively trivial offences.  
Boiling water, red in color, has been found in a mysterious lake situated in a steep-sided basin in the Andes, South America. Animal and plant life does not exist near this basin, which is supposed to be the crater of a semi-extinct volcano, the gases of which agitate the water.

The uniform worn by British hospital nurses, consisting of black shoes and stockings, cotton dress, white starched apron, collars, cuffs, and belt is the same for summer and winter, and weighs about ten pounds, which is much heavier than the usual hot-weather garb worn by women.

New Zealand Has First Woman M.P.  
Wellington, N.Z.—The first woman member to be returned to the New Zealand Parliament was elected recently in Lyttelton. She is Mrs. Elizabeth R. McCombs. She succeeds to the seat made vacant by the death of her husband.  
Mrs. McCombs ran as a Labor candidate and received 6,080 votes. F. W. Freeman, Coalition nominee, obtained 2,450 votes and A. Hills, Independent Labor, 263.

Offers Solution For Surplus Weed Stock  
Rock Hill, S.C.—At last a solution for your surplus weed crop—cross the weeds with tomatoes.  
Wily Bigger, of the Government experimental station at Sand Hill near Columbia, exhibited evidence of the grafting here.  
He showed a jumpson weed with several healthy tomatoes growing on the same stem with a thorny jumpson burr.  
The two plants were grafted early this summer.  
Although Gt. Britain has now fewer ships, employing infinitely fewer men, engaged in the fishing industry than before the War, they produce more fish.

Wheat Exports Much Increased

August Clearances 6,000,000 Bushels Over Same Month in 1932  
Fort William.—Marked improvement in the movement of Canada's wheat to the market places of the world during August is shown in the report of the Board of Grain Commissioners, just issued.  
Low freight rates on the Great Lakes, the report says, militated somewhat against shipments from Churchill, in Northern Manitoba, but lake shipments increased. Production of North America wheat was estimated at 400,000,000 bushels less than last year.  
Export clearances of wheat for the month of August totalled 48,604,883 bushels compared with 42,138,607 bushels during the same period last year. Considerable rye was moved for shipment to the United States and further business is anticipated, the report continues.

Pathetic Story of Child Lost in Woods  
The Ottawa Citizen says editorially: The pathetic story of the little four-year-old lost in the woods around the Quebec village of St. Magloire is a tragic reminder of the dangers that still lurk in dark woods. And now, after two weeks, the search has been abandoned.  
The days of childhood are surrounded, as a part of the loving care bestowed by devoted parents, with the stories that are told for their child's delight—tales of the "Babe in the Wood" and the other fairy tales where all ends happily despite the forest terrors, the witches and the giants. Here even the bears and the wolves are kind, and Mmulus and Remus remain to tell their legendary tale.  
If not at bedtime in St. Magloire, the sad story of little Ghislaine Bail lazeon will now be told, but in warning, to little minds that will perhaps profit by the tragedy of their little playmate. And in the country where legend and story have grown and been passed down ever since the first settler came over from the old to the new France, perhaps in time another strange tale will be added to the store.  
And in the belief of the villagers of St. Magloire that the little Ghislaine has been carried off by a wolf or a bear that abounds in the countryside, would that they could be kind. Perhaps legend will make it so.
