Canada's Debt Increased By \$220,604,653 for '33

Ottawa .- A very substantial amount was added to the Canadian debt last This day remember, deeper still re- year. Official figures, being gazetted, place the addition at \$220,604,653. This was for the fiscal year ended March 31 last, Of this amount \$194,273,752 Yet loyal to the land where now they was the defit on administrative operating account; \$53,422,661 was for the Canadian National, now charged directly to the consolidated account. Then, railway advances from previous years, written off from active to nonactive assets, amounted to \$41,121,216, while, added to the debt on account of harbor boards was \$21,817,023.

The prospects point to another substantial addition as a result of the operation in the current fiscal year. With returns for five months yet to come, there can be no precise estimate, but it is quite apparent that revenues are below those estimated in the budget. New taxation was hoped to produce an extra \$52,000,000. Up to the end of October the receipts were down \$4,000,000. Improvement is now occurring and the extent of it will determine the amount of the decline compared with last year. It may be over \$30,000,000. The Canadian National will probably require \$50,000,000 to square its accounts. In in Canada and the United States.
