Golden Wedding Celebration in Knox Church, Durham

McGirr and Mr. W. J. Young. The address reads: Durham, Jan. 1, 1934

Dear Friends:—Your brethren on the Session and all the members of Knox Church, allow me to congratulate you on this occasion of your golden anniversary.

You have shared many joys and some sorrows in these years gone by and we sincerely hope that in the years that lie before you the joys may still outnumber the sorrows, and that the Good God will grant to you in full measure, health and happiness.

We want to bear tribute to the pleasure of your friendship and tell you that it has helped greatly to ease the strain and lighten the burden of life for all of us.

But, especially, would we express our appreciation of your service in this church. Both of you were ever willing to accept your full share of responsibility and count it a privilege.

In our various organizations, you have been officers and taken a foremost place in the leadership of the church. We will still count on you to share the wealth of your experience with the rest of us, and so provide us with counsel and encouragement to carry on the good work that lies so near your own hearts.

We pray for your God's richest blessings in the eventide of life—and many more years to enjoy the reverent affection of your family, the hearty fellowship of your host of friends and the supreme joy of the worship and service of the church to which you have been devoted these many years.

In acknowledging these many kind evidences and expressions of good wishes, Mr. Ramage spoke for himself and wife, remarking the many privileges they had obtained through their associations with the church, and thanking all for the kindness shown them.

Rev. Mr. Smith, acting as spokesman, called on several guests present, namely W. J. Young, William Ramage, J. A. Graham, Allan Bell, Rev. Walter C. Almack of Queen St. Church, Mrs. T. McGirr and several others, all of whom spoke appreciatively of the honored couple and of the event itself.

Rev. J. Billingsley of Trinity Church, Mayor and Mrs. Kress, were also among the guests, but were unable to be on hand while the programme was being given.

From three until six p. m. the reception, with its atmosphere of sociability and fellowship, was in progress, and it left many pleasant memories with the central couple on the occasion, and with the friends who greeted them.

Ye editor was born near Haddington, Scotland, in the far-back year of 1849, and after learning the trade of printing in the office of the Haddington Courier, came to Canada with his parents and brother William, in the year of Confederation, 1867, arriving one week before the first "Dominion Day."

They settled on the farm on 21st con., Egremont, now owned by Reg. Ramage. For six months the editor worked on "The Pricerville Courier", spent several winters in the lumber woods near Penetang, then attended Collingwood Collegiate under the late Wm. Williams, and Toronto Normal, taking out a teacher's certificate.

Schools taught in were No. 12, Egremont for three years, No. 1 Normanby for ten, and Durham for two years. In June 1894 the Grey Review was purchased from the late Chas. McArthur. It was shortly afterwards changed in name to "The Durham Review" and for nearly forty years, Mr. Ramage has been at the helm.

Mrs. Ramage was Mary J. Coleridge, the third daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Coleridge of the 19th con. Egremont, and before their marriage, on Jan. 1, 1884, she taught in S. S. No. 10 and No. 12, Egremont, and six months near Mount Forest.

Rev. D. P. Niven, then pastor of Amos Church, Dromore, tied the nuptial knot, and they commenced homemaking on the Gadd farm, west of Knox Church, Normanby, where the groom was then teaching. At close of 1892, they removed to Durham, and have since been actively identified with the town and its best interests.

A family of seven was born to them, the eldest daughter Mary, dying at the age of eight years, shortly after coming to Durham. Peter and Miss Alice, now publishing the Review, Dr. Chas. C. of Gorrie; Mrs. R. J. McKnight (Agnes) of Wainfleet; Arthur and Harold, publishers of the Thornbury Review-Herald, are the family. All were present for the reception, except Dr. C. C., who was disappointed owing to impassable roads.

Other relatives present were Mr. Ramage's only brother Wm. W. of Priceville, and his wife, a sister of Mrs. C. Ramage. Also Mrs. Ramage's brother, D. P. Coleridge and Mrs. Coleridge of Holstein, and a nephew, Mr. and Mrs. Reg. Ramage. Mrs. R. was one of a family of ten children, of whom seven now survive, the others being Mrs. R. P. Legate of Edmonton, Alta., Wm. Coleridge of Owen Sound; Frank of Sask., and James of Toronto.

In Durham Mr. Ramage has been prominent in educational and church work, being a trustee and secretary of the Public School Board for many years, and later High School trustee; Secretary of Durham Public Library; Secretary-treas. of the Sons of Scotland, and for fourteen years Division Court clerk.

In Knox Church he was for years congregational secretary, and on the Board of Managers, and a teacher in the Sunday School. For the past thirteen years he has been a member of the Session, Mrs. Ramage, in her active years, was also a worker in the Missionary and Ladies Aid societies of the church, and in the Women's Institute.

Many congratulatory letters and telegrams have been received: two in particular we might refer to: a cablegram on Saturday from cousins in far-away New Zealand, and a telegram on Monday from Col. D. M. Robertson, Grand Secy. of the Sons of Scotland Benevolent Association in Toronto.

There was a visitors' book at the church reception Monday. While almost all signed it, there are yet some we think, whose names are not recorded thereon. We would like a complete list, so add this as a reminder to those who did not sign, to inform us.

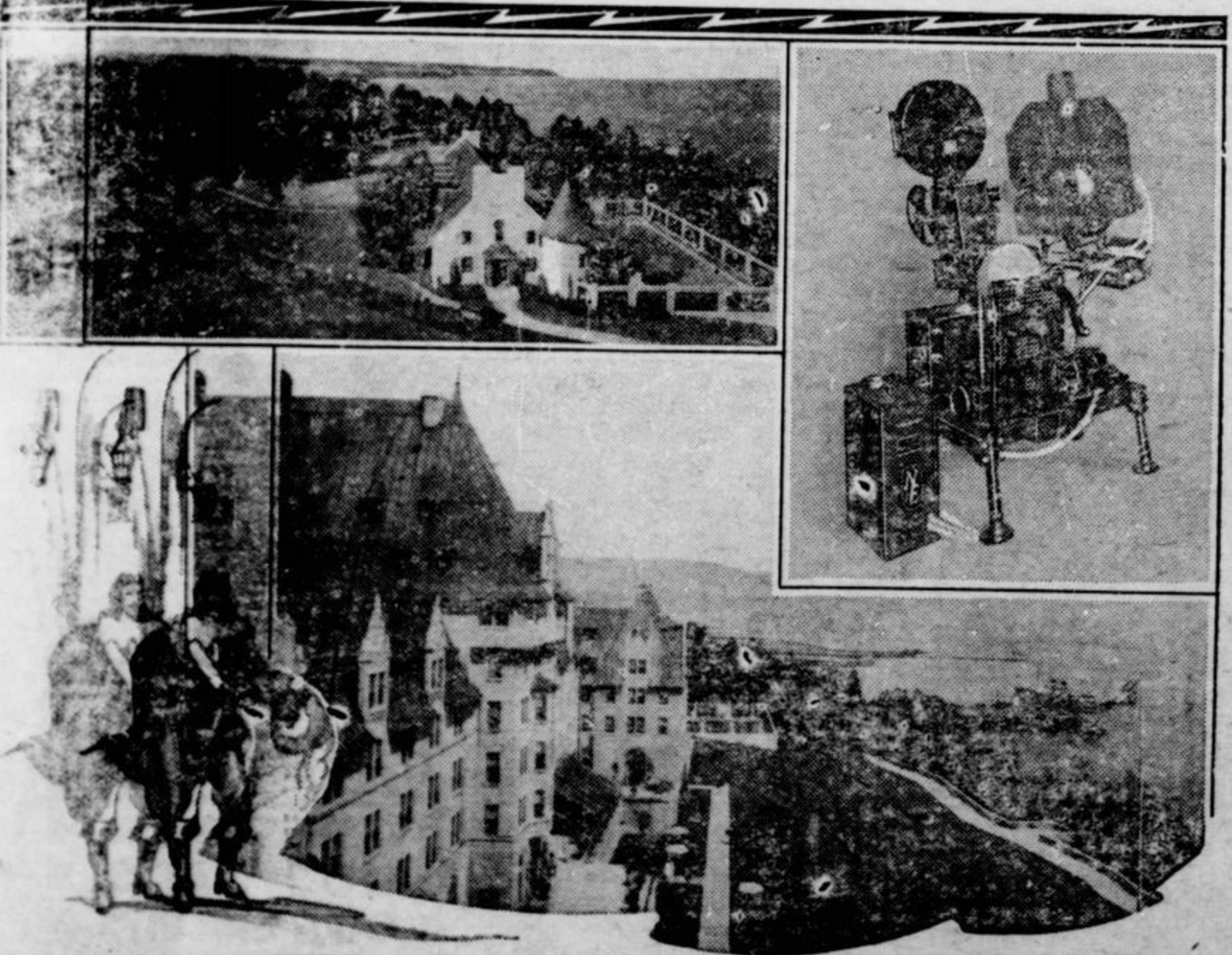
