Editor Thurston has been a close and good fraternal neighbor to the Review these many years back and it is hard to say which of the two paper Editors first thought of January as a wedding month. Mr. Thurston is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James M. Thurston, pioneers of Kimberley. Mrs. Thurston is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Francis Landin, and was born at Dalhousie, N. B. She came with her parents to Thornbury in the year 1863. Six children were born to them: A. S. Thurston, of Thornbury; F. J. Thurston, Flesherton, partner in the Advance; Mrs. N. K. Durrant of Mitchell; Mrs. R. W. Shaw of Lion's Head; and Miss Dell Thurston, a

teacher in Toronto, being those still living.

Lt. Arnold M. Thurston enlisted from Toronto University with the artillery and was killed in action June 26, 1916.

Mr. Thurston is the dean of the newspaper fraternity of Grey County and is still actively engaged in editorial work. Prior to coming to Flesherton in 1888, he was connected with the old Toronto World under W. F. McLean for a number of years, and was also at one time with the Toronto Globe.
