Chesley's new Intermediate O. H. A. entry had a test of strength last Friday night when they came over to meet the local intermediates in an exhibition contest. Durham were victors, 6-4, but while having the pre- dominance in play, did not have a sinecure by any means. The visitors are a free-skating, aggressive team, with youth and experience intermingled and were a threat at all times, though never in the lead. While flashes of Al hockey were at times apparent, on the whole it was not a serious struggle, and both teams will require to display a considerably improved brand of hockey before they will cut much of a dash in the play-offs.
