**EGREMONT COUNCIL**

Council met January 8th. Members  
elect subscribed to the Statutory Decla-  
ration of Office and took their seats  
as members of council for 1934.  
Reeve William H. Hunter, Deputy-  
reeve William J. Philp, Councilors S.  
M. Patterson, William J. Aldcorn, Al-  
bert H. Owens.

The Reeve addressed the Council  
followed by the other members.

Minutes of the meeting held Decem-  
ber 15th, read and confirmed.

Aldcorn-Philp: That the report of  
the road superintendent for work on  
roads and bridges be adopted.—Carried.

Patterson-Aldcorn: That the reeve  
and clerk be authorized to sign and  
submit to the Minister of Public  
Works and Highways of the Province  
of Ontario the petition of the Corpora-  
tion of the Township of Egremont

showing that during the period, Janu-  
ary 1, '33 to December 31, '33, there  
has been expended upon the township  
roads the sum of \$6,518.21 and re-  
questing the Statutory grant on that  
amount as provided by the Ontario  
Highways Act.—Carried.

Owens-Aldcorn: That the Clerk be  
instructed to notify the County Clerk  
that unless our clerk is notified im-  
mediately on receipt of Hospital bills  
we will refuse to pay same.—Carried.

Aldcorn-Philp: That the treasurer  
be instructed to refund the \$2.00 dog  
tax paid in error to Arthur McDoug-  
all.—Carried.

Philp-Owens: That the Hospital  
bill for William Ferguson be paid and  
the clerk be instructed to bill Mr.  
Ferguson for the total amount, \$112.  
00, also in the matter of the Hospital  
bill of Geo. Seaman, the clerk no-  
tify the County treasurer that we re-  
fuse to pay as we have never been  
notified and we consider that he is  
quite able to pay his own hospital  
bills and the clerk be instructed to  
notify the County Clerk to that effect.  
—Carried.

The auditors presented their re-  
port which was received and adopted.

Owens-Aldcorn: That the Clerk be  
instructed to have 100 copies printed  
for distribution.—Carried.

Aldcorn-Owens: That Alex. Ross's  
resignation be accepted as sheep val-  
uator in division No. 4, and a by-law

of the Municipal World be ordered  
for 1934.—Carried.
