THAWING WATER PIPES CAUSES BARN FIRE While thawing out water pipes on the farm of Capt. L. F. Darling, at Mountain Lake, near Meaford, on Tuesday last, sparks unnoticed ignited the hay and the barn and contents went quickly up in flames.

The new barn was a splendid structure and had only been recently built or remodelled and was in splendid shape with a steel roof. Fortunately his live stock was saved and three pigs were the only animals to suffer. A large quantity of hay and straw as well as some 600 bus. of grain were destroyed. The loss will easily run some \$3000 with only partial insurance. Capt. Darling conducts a fruit farm and his place is well equipped with a water service from the lake, as well as other modern equipment which he spent much time in acquiring.

Woolens Going Up Sharp increases in the cost of wool yarns, cottons, etc., are given by wholesale clothing manufacturers as the reason for the imminent rise in the selling price of clothing. According to a circular to the dealers, issued by a prominent Canadian mill during the past year, has been as follows: Middling cotton, increase from six and a quarter to eleven cents; cotton yarns, increase from twenty-one cents to twenty-seven cents; botany wool tops were thirty-eight cents a year ago and now ninety-four and a quarter cents; dryspun botany wool yarn is now \$1.22 and in January 1933 it was 27c.
