The Grim Reaper Busy in Durham and District

MRS. WILLIAM RITCHIE

Death came as a peaceful release from the illness and suffering of Mrs. William Ritchie of town, at midnight Saturday, March 10th. The last call was not unlooked for, as the patient had been sinking gradually the past week and the day or two previous to death, was in a coma. Three weeks ago Mrs. Ritchie first took to her bed—a sufferer from dropsy and in these weeks it was necessary to have two or three operations in tapping the fluid to relieve the distress. From the first, the two daughters at home have had the assistance of their aunt, Mrs. Wm. Scarf, as nurse to her sister, also deceased's daughter-in-law, Mrs. Wm. J. Ritchie, of Edge Hill.

On Feb. 27th last, Mrs. Ritchie completed seventy nine years of life, these years having entirely been spent at Edge Hill and Durham. Born on lot 44, con2, Glenelg, the daughter of the first pioneers of Edge Hill—Mr. and Mrs. James Edge,—she knew much and heard more of pioneer conditions and trials. Her father was in the Edge Hill district around 1848, with the Crown Land survey- or, and assisted in staking out the lots along the 2nd con. of Glenelg. The Edge home at Edge Hill became the centre of community life and the hospitality and courtesy extended to all sojourners in these early days, had not been feeling well for some time, but on Friday, March 2, suffer- ed a slight paralytic stroke. He might have overcome this, had not another stroke set in on the 9th in- stant—a week later. From this he went into a coma, from which he never rallied.

The late Mr. Coleridge was born on the 20th con, Egremont, the third son of the late Daniel and Mrs. Coleridge, natives of Devon, England. His boyhood and school years were spent like that of many another pi- oneer son, i. e., plenty of hard work with snatches of schooling. How he surmounted obstacles and difficulties has been often the remark and admiration of his friends. He possessed a firm will power and whatever he set out to accomplish saw the thing through.

When a young man he left for Kenilworth, where he became an apprentice in a cheese factory. This ultimately proved to be his life work at which he was eminently suc- cessful. From Kenilworth, he went to Yeovil, where he took over the cheese factory there, a flourishing concern at that time. It was while here, he met and later wedded Jessie Reid, daughter of the late Mr and Mrs John Reid. They were married in 1902, and since their marriage have resided in Owen Sound, with the exception of a few years at Al- lenford, when they owned and oper- ated a general store.

Before leaving Owen Sound for Allenford, Mr Coleridge was employ- ed with the Elias Lemon Dairy and Produce house for several years. A- bout twelve years ago, he managed the Holstein Creamery for a season. The damp atmosphere in which it was necessary for him to work in Creameries, had the ultimate effect of rheumatism settling in his limbs, and this work had to cease.

There were born to Mr and Mrs. Coleridge, four children: Arthur, of Detroit; Miss Jessie, nurse, London; Mary, (Mrs Arthur Charlton,) Lon- don; Miss Ethel, at home. There also survive three brothers and three sisters, viz: Daniel Coleridge, Holstein; Frank K. Coleridge, Nut Mountain, Sask.; James H. Coleridge, Toronto; Lizzie, Mrs R. P. Legate, Edmonton; Mary, Mrs Wm. Ramage, Durham; Louisa, Mrs Wm. Ramage, Priceville. The funeral service was held in Owen Sound on Wednesday; remains to lie in morgue until better road conditions prevail, when interment will be made at Dromore.

MRS. ROBERT WEBBER
