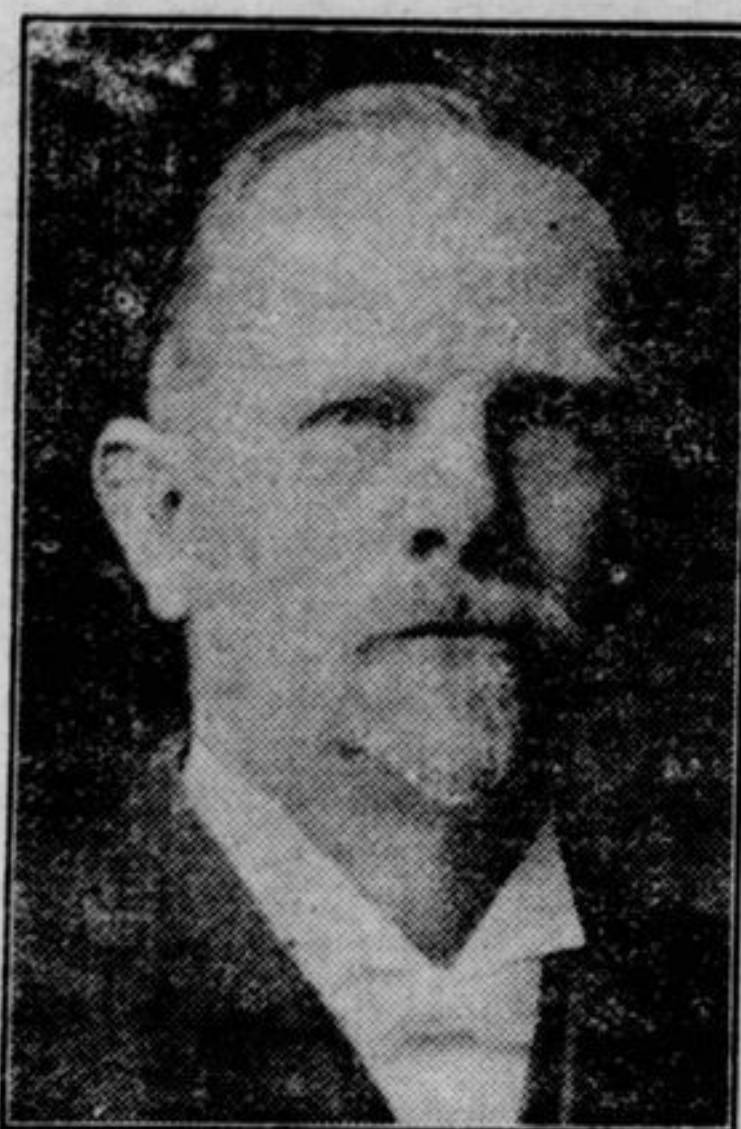

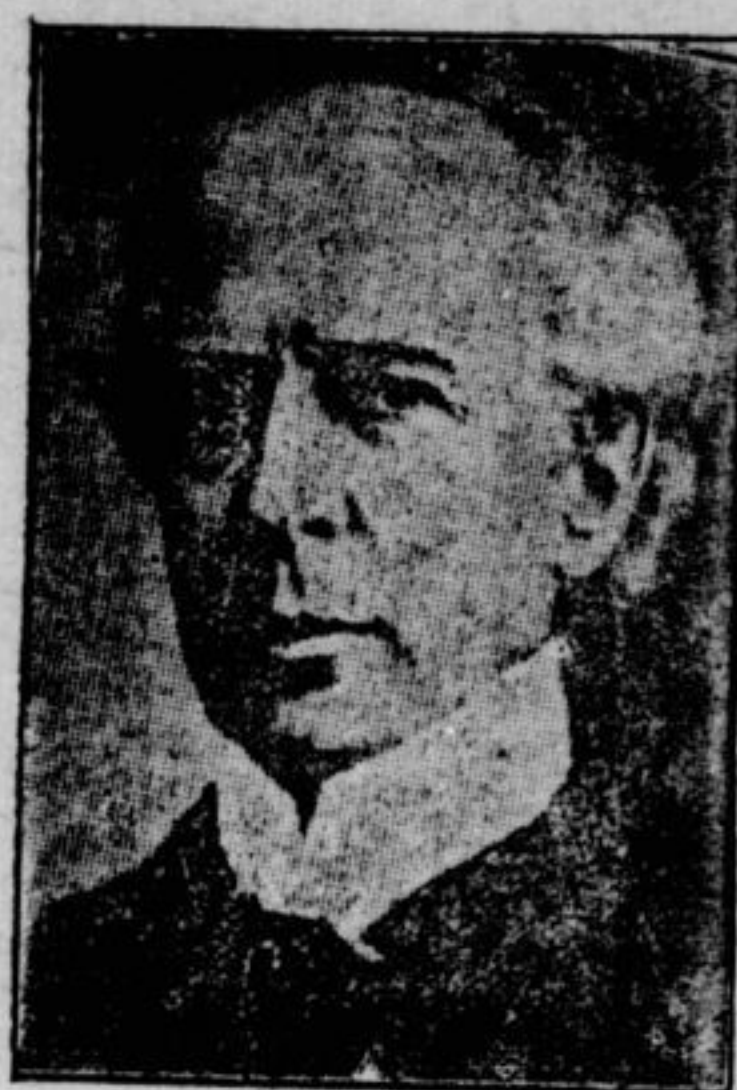

came with her parents to Canada, crossing in a sailing vessel, then by train to Hamilton, where they were met by a cousin, Charles Vollett with a wagon to convey them to Durham.

In 1864, Sarah Grace became the bride of Robert Gadd Webber. They began home-making on the farm in Normanby Tp., where Andrew Marshall Jr. now resides. Two years later they purchased the farm on the 3rd con. in Bentinck, made a clearing in the woods and then built their house. Thus, for the past 70 years, Mrs. Webber has resided on this homestead. Up to the last year, Mrs. Webber has taken a deep interest in what went on around her and the home. Mrs. Webber is possibly the oldest member of Durham Baptist Church. She was one of the many who made public confession of their faith in God after the Great Revival of 1877-78. It began in the Baptist Church under the leadership of Rev. Grant. Mrs. Webber was an active worker in church interests and a regular attendant at services as long as health was her portion. She was a life member of the Mission Circle.

Fourteen children were born to Mr and Mrs. Webber, ten of whom survive. They are: Robert, Bentinck; Arthur, of Swift Current; George and Albert, at home; Mary Ann, Mrs Douglas Mountain; Jennie, Mrs J. A. Browne; Maria, Mrs Jno. Ritchie; Charlotte, Mrs Chas. Ritchie, all near home; Susanna, Mrs. J. Sirrs, Unity, Sask.; and Bessie at home. Mr Webber passed away in 1923.

Mrs Webber has seen many changes in the country in the past 75 years and the many settlers and neighbors she has done the kindly act for, remember her with kindly gratitude to-day. Two brothers and three sisters are the surviving members of a one-time family of sixteen: George Mead, Columbus, Ohio; Robt. Mead, Unity, Sask.; Elizabeth, Mrs Lockwood Elvidge, Durham; Hattie, Mrs. L'nnell, Summerberry, Sask.; Mrs. McTammany, Akron, Ohio.
