In 1932, the last year for which com- charge in Ontario at the rates prevaparative figures are available, all the domestic consumers served by Hy. prevent Ontario consumers from usdro municipalities used an aggregate of 740,000,000 kilowatt-hours for which they paid the aggregate sum of \$111,676,000, or an average cost, inclusive of all charges, of only 1.57 cents per kilowatt-hour. According to United States census figures for 1932, the domestic consumers served by privately owned utiliies in that country paid an average of 5.60 cents per kilowatt-hour.

It is a simple matter to compute that, if Ontario Hydro domestic consumers had had to pay, for the 740. 000,000 kilowatt hours they used in 1932, as much per kilowatt-hour as United States consumers paid, their bills would have aggregated the vast sum of \$41,490,000, or nearly \$30,000. 000 more than the amount their electricity actually cost them under


