126,872 Live In 22,000 Dwellings

Interesting Figures on Various Types of Buildings in Ottawa Given in Report

Ottawa with a population of 126,872, has 22,000 dwellings of which 15,106 are either of brick or brick veneer construction.

Dwelling is Defined The Bureau declares that a dwelling for census purposes, is a place in which, at the time of the census, one or more persons regularly sleep.

In all Canada there are 1,984,286 dwellings of which 881,859 are in the urban areas and 1,092,397, in the rural parts of the country.

There were 1,393,895 houses built of wood, 459,646 of brick or brick veneer, 76,105 of stucco and 31,391 of stone.

There were 2,214,043 structurally separate units, of which 1,007,327 were rural and 1,206,706 urban.

The population of Canada at the census was 10,362,833, of which 4,792,135 was rural and 5,570,698 urban.

The number of persons per dwelling house was 1.14, rural being 1.02 and urban 1.27.

The number of persons per dwelling house was 5.22, rural being 4.78 and urban 5.67.

Trebles Tonnage

Toronto.—The total water-borne cargo tonnage of Toronto harbor has been practically trebled in the past four years, according to the recent statement of the Harbor Commission.

In 1929 the tonnage was 809,659; in 1930, 1,292,864; in 1931, 2,122,066, and in 1932, 2,270,445.

This increase in water-borne trade is attributed to the opening of the Welland Ship Canal in 1931, the statement continued.

During 1933, 31 ocean freighters came directly to Toronto with cargoes totaling 26,286 tons.

In 1927 coal shipments by water totaled 136,246 tons, and in 1933 the total was 1,328,286 tons.

Perching on the train at Seba, between Hudson Bay Junction, Sask., and The Pas, the ptarmigan rode on the running board of the locomotive, oblivious to the shrieking whistle and clanging bell.

A recent proposal was made to abolish grand juries as part of our administration of law in Ontario and to substitute a government official for the ancient grand inquest of the county.

In Ontario no man can ever be placed on trial for a serious crime until a grand jury of his fellow-citizens have investigated his alleged offence, and have declared that he should be tried for it.

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Crime Increase in Province

14,538 Persons Sentenced During '33 as Against 21,421 in 1930.

The recent play of the spotlight on conditions in certain of the penal institutions in this country has emphasized the high standard of excellence maintained in the gaols and reformatories in Ontario.

The Provincial Secretary's reports show not only a substantial decrease in crime in the Province — 14,538 persons were sentenced to prison in 1933, as compared with 21,421 in 1930 — but also a reduction in the next expenditure upon these institutions in the last two years amounting to \$188,394.44.

Such general falling off of crime is in no small measure due to the progressive advancement methods adopted in the treatment of criminals — Mr. C. F. Neelds, the Assistant Provincial Secretary, in his report dated January 11th, 1934, states that only two decades have passed since the open Reformatory system was adopted in this Province.

He points out that much of this period was experimental, and part was beset with difficulty in obtaining competent officers, since it requires years of training before an officer can be regarded as fully capable.

The wedding in effect and care in replacements are now showing results of which the people of this province can well be proud.
