## New Fire Brigade to be Appointed

Durham Council held a special session on Tuesday evening, at which all members were present.

The resignation of the Fire Brigade and Chief, placed in the Clerk's hands over a week ago, was accepted, and a motion passed that a new Chief and Brigade be advertised for in the local papers, all applications to be in the Clerk's hands by May 22nd.

Some relief was necessary after May 1st, but a resolution that all relief in town, be cut off after May 14th, was unanimously carried.

The Board of Works chairman was authorized to have the plank wall repaired in front of the Geo. Gildron property on George St.

The treasurer brought in a tax report, showing \$1741 of 1933 taxes and \$653.56 of arrears paid since Jan. 1. There are still \$4372.30 of 1933 taxes outstanding and nearly \$5000 of arrears. The treasurer was authorized to submit a statement of all arrears of taxes at Court of Revision meeting on May 28th, and a separate list of all over three years in arrears which properties will be put up for sale at a tax sale this fall.

## CHEMICAL BLOW UP; PRINCIPAL IS INJURED

While conducting an experiment in chemistry before an Agricultural class, C. F. Lawrence, principal of Agincourt Continuation School, was severely burned about the hands and face by a violent explosion. The burns extended over his face and partly into his right eye. His right hand and wrist were also injured.

Dr. C. D. Farquharson, who attended Principal Lawrence, was unable to state whether the facial burns would permanently affect the principal's sight. Mr. Lawrence stated that he was putting a small piece of sodium in a bottle for storage, when the explosion occurred. The bottle was supposed to contain coal oil but apparently some water was mixed in with the coal oil and enough of it became gathered in one place so as to ignite the sodium, the principal explained.

Mr. Lawrence is a son of the late T. H. Lawrence, Bentinck, and a nephew of Chas. G. Lawrence, Durham.

## Death Calls E of Port Elgin Times

A loss to the printing and publishing business of Ontario, was sustained on Saturday last, when F. R. Wesley, editor and proprietor of the Port Elgin Times, passed away, in his 40th year, following an illness of three weeks from a heart affection.

The late Mr. Wesley was literally brought up in the newspaper business, his father having been the owner of the Bruce Herald at Walkerton, which later became the 'Herald and Times' and passed into the hands of another son, J. A. Wesley, the present owner. He learned the printing art in his father's office and thus fitted himself for his future business career.

14 years ago he purchased the Port Elgin Times, from E. Roy Sayles and has since successfully carried on its publication. During his residence in Port Elgin, the late Mr. Wesley interested himself in many matters of public interest. He served on both High and Public School Boards, Treas. of Port Elgin Horticultural Society. He was an intense lover of clean, outdoor sports and used every opportunity to encourage the young people to indulge in them. In 1912, he was a member of Hanover Lacrosse club when it won the Junior championship of the Can. Lacrosse Association. At the time of death, he was President of Bruce Press Association.

He will be mourned by his wife and two daughters, also one brother and two sisters.

## Liberals Decide not to Nominate Candidate

Largely Attended Convention

The largest and most enthusiastic Convention of South Grey Liberals in years, assembled in Durham hall, Wednesday for election of officers and to discuss entering a candidate in the Provincial field.

Several were anxious to name a candidate and go into action; others claimed it unwise at present to split the forces opposed to the Henry administration, seeing that F. R. Oliver, M.P.P., was now in the field. A free and frank discussion was held those taking part being D. T. Wright of Dundalk; W. E. Harris, Dr. Carefoot, Dr. J. A. McArthur, Markdale; Dr. Sneath, President, Dr. Smith, J. H. McQuarrie, Durham; John Mills and S. B. Clarke, Hanover; John Aitken, Normanby, and several others. Several motions and amendments were made, a joint convention with the U.F.O. party suggested and finally a standing vote taken on the question of nominating a candidate. By a vote of approximately 3 to 2, the gathering voted against any nomination for the Provincial field, and the matter thus definitely settled for the coming contest.

In opening, President Dr. T. H. Sneath, remarked it was evident Liberalism was not dead, by the splendid attendance. He first called for election of officers and all were re-elected except Dr. J. A. McArthur who retired as Secy-Treas. and is succeeded by J. H. McQuarrie. Other officials are: President, Dr. Sneath, Durham; Vice Pres., J. H. Sudden, of Chatsworth; 2nd Vice, Mrs. V. Glebe, Ayton; 3rd Vice, J. H. Hunter, Durham; Auditors, E. F. Graft, Hanover and P. Ramage, Durham.

The speaker of the day was Dr. Simpson, of Barrie, M.P.P. for East Simcoe, who gave a rousing address and predicted a landslide to Liberalism next month. We regret time does not permit a further detailed report this week.
