From Review file, May 8, 1919

Three of the parties who lost horses in the fire, were insured in the Grey and Bruce, and will get their insurance, a clause in the policy, inserted, we believe by the late H. H. Miller, providing that the insurance follows the horse, if the owner or servant is with it.

On Friday last, a little surprise was given by 4th room students to their teacher, A. S. Morton, when they presented him and bride with a handsome cut glass vase, cup and saucer and bouquet of flowers.
