cost of gov't by 50%, could and must be done. Hepburn had made constructive suggestions; first to protest against size of cabinet, next urged membership cut which was done from 112 to 90 and urged overlapping reduced.

The Henry Gov't promises people on relief 25% increase--it's trying to bribe the public with their own money. It promises increased pay on Prov. and Trans Canada highways--why not last year? Why the tremendous amount of roadwork now? Why reduce hydro contracts for farms from 20 to 5 year term now? It's all propaganda and bribery on the eve of a general election.

'The Straight Furrow' pictured Premier Henry doing morning farm chores. After election he could devote all his time to them. Henry is a large shareholder in Toronto Mortgage Corp, which pays 12% dividends in depression years; also director of a large Toronto milk concern which pays farmers 3c a quart and sells to public for 10 and 11c.

What would Liberals do if elected? They would give all a new and square deal; return to responsible government; reduce administration costs 50%; give hydro to rural users at much less cost, take over the whole cost of Prov'l Highways, completely overhaul the Education Dept. and conduct an impartial investigation into hydro, liquor board, etc.

Henry says: "your leader is your policy." Mitchell Hepburn is one of the most capable, energetic young men Ontario has produced and will make his mark. His policy in one word is "economy." A landslide at next election would, he predicted, sweep the Tory party out of power.

Dr. Simpson stated he was not here, or sent here, to dictate any course of action to South Grey Liberals. "You must think the matter out for yourselves. The important thing is that South Grey must not return a Conservative." Every seat might count though he did not think one seat would affect the ultimate result. "Your action today may affect other ridings; decide one way or the other regarding naming a candidate, but be united in what you do."
