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Cheap Holiday in France is Now a Thing of the Past

Tourists in France this year will find that the days of really cheap holidays are definitely over, and most of the everyday needs of the visitor cost slightly more than in London.

The franc, roughly equivalent to 6 cents will go as far as 6 cents does in London for some things but for a great many others, not so far.

A cup of coffee in one of the cafes now averages 12 cents, but this includes the tip, which is still 10 per cent of the bill. Sandwiches range from 12 to 25 cents. An aperitif costs anything from 12 to 35 cents, but a cocktail costs 40 to 50 cents.

In the cocktail bar of the famous "Blue Train," to the Riviera the cheapest cocktail is 75 cents.

A whiskey and soda will cost about 60 cents and a glass of (French) beer from 15 to 25 cents.

Including table wine an ordinary meal in a moderate restaurant costs about \$1.25.

To send a postcard home, if it contains correspondence, costs 6 cents and a letter 9 cents.

Once the Paris taxis were models of cheapness, but it is now estimated that the average short journey made by tourists costs 25 to 35 cents.

Three Monuments For Three Rivers

Three Rivers—Three monuments will be unveiled here during the tercentenary celebration this summer, it was announced recently.

The first monument will be in memory of Sieur de Lavolette founder of the city of Three Rivers. De La Verendrye, celebrated explorer who discovered the Rock Mountains, will also be honored with a monument in his name. The third monument will perpetuate the memory of Benjamin Sulte, noted historian.

Shortage of Houses Found at Edmonton

Edmonton.—Edmonton requires 4,000 new homes and could continue erecting 300 annually without overtaxing her needs, E. Lichfield told the civic finance committee in advocating a housing scheme to aid building trades workers.

Under his plan the homes would be built by the city and sold on a pay-like-rent basis. It calls for an expenditure of \$250,000 capital annually over a period of six years. Ultimately, it would mean a revenue of \$200,000 in new taxes, he said.

Fought 68 Years Ago

FORT ERIE—Two old soldiers recalled that 68 years ago June 2nd last they engaged in the battle of Limestone Ridge, now Ridgeway, between invading Penfau and Canadian Volunteers. One is Private Sam Wilson, Fort Erie North, 83, who was rejected by the Haldimand rifles, and then accepted by the York company. The other is Lieut. Albert W. Reaveley, 88, who was attached to the Royal Canadian Artillery.

Heart Mended Young Astor to Wed Friend of Girl Who Jilted Him

New York—John Jacob Astor, 3rd, is going to marry a debutante who was to have been a bridesmaid at the rich young man's once-planned wedding to Eileen S. S. Gillespie.

Astor, just returned from a trip around the world to "forget" his broken romance with Miss Gillespie, is now engaged to Eileen Tuck French. The engagement was announced recently.

Miss French is the daughter of Mrs. Livingston French of New York and Newport and had been chosen by Miss Gillespie to be one of her bridesmaids at her wedding to Astor, which was called off two weeks before it was to have taken place last February 6.

Shortly after Miss Gillespie's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Lewis Gillespie, announced termination of their daughter's engagement to Astor, the young man departed on a world cruise. Friends said he sailed to "forget" and "cure his broken heart."

Astor, a son of John Jacob Astor, who lost his life in the Titanic disaster, was 21 years old last August.

Perils of Highway

If six persons were fatally injured and fourteen badly hurt in a railway collision, would there not be a considerable rumpus raised? Yet the six who were killed in the Ohio highway collision when a bus, trying to pass a parked freight truck, ran head-on into another truck are just as dead as if they had been killed in a railroad smash-up.

To the perils of the road have been added the perils of the big freighters. Huge bulks, carriers of heavy tonnage, they loom ahead of the driver who approaches from the rear with such enormous size that he has no way of seeing the road ahead. This is particularly true when a highway freight train is parked at the side of the road. In that fatal wreck at Elvira, Ohio, the driver of the bus sought to pass the parked freighter, which was his right; but he could not see far enough ahead to decide whether the road was clear, and when he could see, he had not enough time to cut in ahead of the parked machine and resume his own lane.

This situation calls for regulation. Clearly there is responsibility somewhere for the death of six persons. Highway fatalities already are so high as to make the public road one of the most unsafe places in the world. Sooner or later, the whole question will have to be threshed out. It is appears imperative that freight be moved by motor vehicles, some sort of private right of way, or toll road should be provided. The public has some right on its own highway which private interests are bound to respect.—Schenectady Union-Star.

Corn Planting Retarded

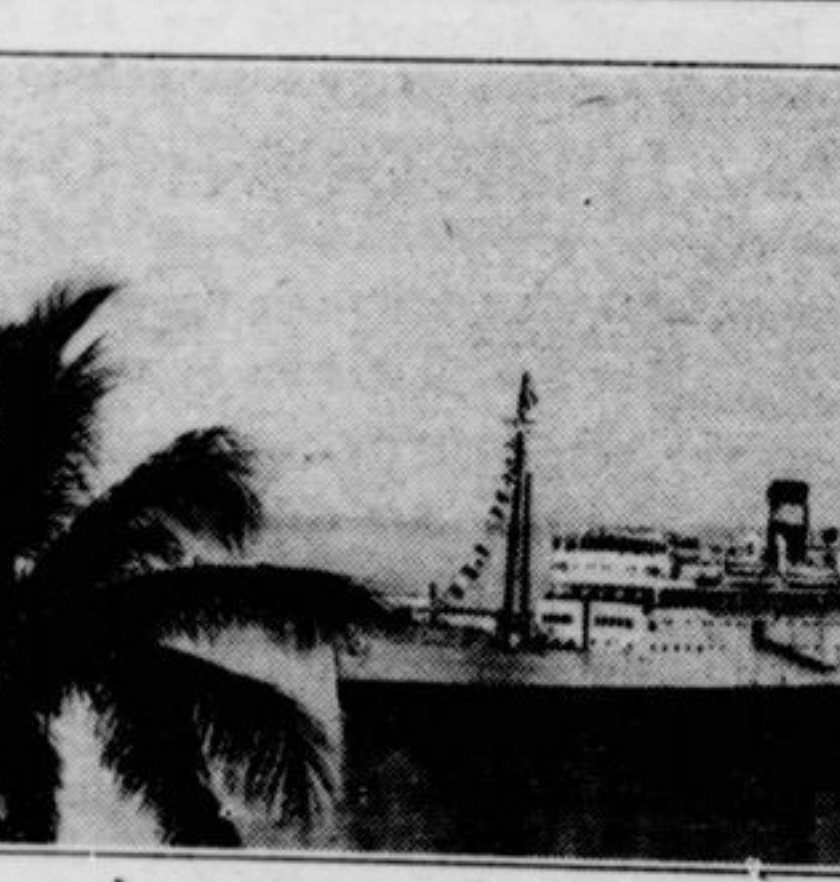

LESSON 11 The small landscape sketch illustrated in Fig. 58 is known in the profession as a Spot illustration. It demonstrates the use of the decorative quality in illustration work. Decorative Spots may be used either in advertising or story illustrations.

You will remember in Lesson 4, Fig. 29 we illustrated a medium known as Stipple which is made by the point of the pen. Fig. 59 illustrates a patch of light stipple made with a fine pen point and Fig. 60 a darker patch made with a ball pointed pen. So far this stipple has

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been made each dot one at a time. Now in Fig. 61 we demonstrate a variegated stipple made by a series of dots running into one another and thus giving a different technique than previously shown.

Figs. 62 and 63 illustrate a technique known as spatter work and is made with the aid of a stiff brush on which ink has been placed, then by turning the brush upside down and drawing a pencil or piece of wood along the bristles, a tone of spatter dots is thrown over the paper as illustrated here. If you want fine spatter dots, hold the brush high above the paper, the closer the brush is held to the paper, the coarser the spatter work. Spatter work is very effective for illustrating dust thrown up from a galloping horse's hoofs and is also used for tinting backgrounds, etc.

Ex. No. 15—Make a decorative drawing and add a touch of stipple or spatter work somewhere on the drawing. In order to offset any spatter work appearing on the paper which you wish to remain white, you must cover up with a sheet of paper cutting out the portions that you wish to be spattered.

"Accident Addicts" Cause The Trouble

Walter V. Bingham, in N.Y. Times

The vast majority of drivers rarely, if ever, have accidents. A study was made of the complete records of 5,000 men to see how many good, medium and bad drivers there were. No less than 63 per cent. of these motorists came through a period of five years without any accidents at all.

Another 24 per cent. had but one each. Now a man who can drive a car for five years under all kinds of conditions without having a reportable accident is certainly entitled to be classed as a No. 1.

Even if he does have a single accident, he is still quite properly recognized as a "good" driver. So, if we regard the 63 per cent. who had no accidents in five years as A-1 and the drivers who had only one accident as good, we have no less than 87 per cent. who are good operators.

Bad Drivers

So much on the right side of the ledger. What is on the opposite page? If most drivers are good drivers, why all the accidents? Why is it apparently inevitable that 30,000 of us will be killed and a million more injured in automobile accidents during this year of grace 1934 and during each year thereafter? It is because about 13 per cent. of the drivers are accident addicts. These drivers have accidents, not last year only, not this year only, but almost every year. They will keep on having accidents indefinitely, unless their driving improves, or they are taken off the road, or they kill themselves.

"Unless their driving improves" it has been demonstrated that most of these accident addicts—the "unlucky" 13 per cent.—can be cured of their unsafe ways. It is not necessary permanently to refuse them the right to drive. It is necessary to organize the oversight, re-education and follow-up of this small but dangerous minority.

Habitual

The habits, characteristics and persistence of these accident addicts have been studied. It has been shown that they can be readily identified, isolated and cured before they have proceeded far in their course of destruction. In the past all the regulations, administrative control and public safety education have not sufficed because the importance of this primary fact has not been fully grasped. Instead, an enormous expenditure of money and effort has been lavished on the good drivers.

Parents of Today Co-operate With School Teachers

Today parents actively co-operate with school teachers but 60 years ago teachers often require police protection against irate parents who regarded the schools as objects of hatred.

This is the assertion of "The School in England and Wales, issued by the National Union of Teachers. Every phase of modern school life is shown in pictures—from babies' classes, percussion bands, gardening into cutting and all forms of handwork, surveying and machine construction, to mothercraft folk dancing, music, games, art and the drama.

An introduction by Sir Henry Richards states that "our elementary schools are, in the opinion of those best fitted to judge, unequalled as training grounds for good citizens."

Every page of the book, every picture and every development, is a tribute to the teaching profession. It is pointed out that the schools depend upon the teachers. Much has been accomplished in the last 60 years, but the achievements are only an earnest of what could be done if the teachers were freed from salary negotiations and allowed to concentrate on their jobs, the book says.

Decline in Manners

The decline in manners has become clearly marked during the past few years and is by no means confined to one sex. Ordinary politeness and civility have departed from the masses and their exercise is, apparently something to be forgotten rather than promoted. It is now regarded in many quarters as the smart thing to be impolite and rude, and the influence of the home and the school, which has fallen down in so many other things, is equally negligible in this regard.

Women of India Still Unable to Vote Or Run for Office

Pressed to a division the Punjab Council at Lahore, India, rejected a resolution that disqualification for registration on electoral rolls of municipalities and district boards should be removed in respect of women and they should be allowed to stand as candidates for those bodies.

There was a lively discussion on the motion which was moved by Shrimati Lehwati Jain, a leader in the movement for the rights of women of India.

The Minister for Local Self-Government pointed out that the municipalities were empowered to remove the sex disqualification by adopting a resolution to that effect. He stated that if women were enfranchised one community would be benefited, while the other one, namely the Muslims, would not have the advantage as the women of the Muslim community might not go to the polling booths as freely as those of the other community.

The Minister expressed the sympathy of the Government with the resolution.
