ROBERT WRIGHT

South Grey's Inspector of Public Schools, Robert Wright, passed away at his home at Hanover on Thursday last, after a lengthy illness. He has been school inspector for the past 18 years, succeeding the late N. W. Campbell, of Durham. Heart trouble, was the immediate cause of death. He was 60 years of age, a native of Grey County, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. Wright. He was educated at Collingwood Collegiate. Surviving him are his wife, formerly Miss Bertha Choate of Lafleette, near Brantford and two brothers, David W. Wright, Principal Dundalk High School and John of Flesheton. One brother, Justice William H. Wright, predeceased him on Jan. 21st of this year.

The late inspector with his scholarly attainments, combined a very high sense of duty and responsibility for his work and was generally liked and esteemed by his family of over 90 teachers in South Grey. He was a member of a prominent Grey County family who are fast disappearing from its civic ranks. In politics, he was a Liberal and a member of the United Church. In his death, Hanover has lost a splendid citizen.

MRS. JOHN WILKINSON

Very sudden and sad was the death on Friday last, near Mount Forest, of Mrs John Wilkinson. Her sister, Mrs Moody, of Durham, had been staying with her, while her husband was in the West, attending the last rite of his wife's sister, Mrs Herbert Wilkinson. Mrs John Wilkinson was at her light household tasks, when with little or no warning to Mrs. Moody, she suddenly expired. The husband was communicated with in Sask, and he reached the sad home Tuesday.

Mrs. Wilkinson was born on the old homestead in Egremont, near Weider's Lake, 55 years ago. Over 30 years ago she was wedded to her husband, who mourns her loss to-day with a family of four children: Mrs. Owens, Mount Forest; Carl, Lawrence and Gladys at home.

Mrs Wilkinson is also survived by one brother, Wm J., of Orange Valley, and four sisters, Mrs Jas. Matthews, Mrs Moody, Mrs T. Davis and Mrs. S. Chapman, all of Durham, and Mrs W. J. Wilson, Boothville. After their marriage they lived for a time at Dromore, before moving to a farm near Mt Forest. Mrs Wilkinson took an active interest in Woodland Church and her home life with her family, is a beautiful memory. The funeral services were held on Wednesday from her late home, in the cemetery at Woodland.

She leaves to mourn her loss her husband and two sons—Ernest living near Durham and Willie on the homestead; also five brothers and two sisters: George and Joe near Meaford, Wm. near Owen Sound, Albert and Arthur on the 8th con.
