

CAMP BORDEN AIR PORT TO BE ABANDONED

Camp Borden is about to become a thing of the past. An exchange of between federal and provincial governments is awaiting final approval according to Queen's Park officials.

Under the exchange the province will receive the Camp Borden property near Barrie and hand over to the Federal government the Petawawa property near Ottawa.

Negotiations in this connection have been proceeding for nearly ten

years under the direction of Hon. W. Finlayson, minister of lands and forests, who intimated that he felt a final agreement should be reached shortly.

The Petawawa property, owned by the Ontario government, was established as an artillery camp many years ago. No rent was paid by the federal government, and during the war it acquired the Camp Borden property. The latter was paid for, but the price was not locally known.

The Camp Borden property comprises 24 square miles and the Petawawa property 60 square miles.

While the Ontario government would receive a smaller amount of land, it is felt the federal government would provide a cash payment, including taxes, to balance the bargain.

The federal government intends, it is explained, to abandon Camp Borden, moving their present flying camp to the new Trenton airport, although Camp Borden is now equipped with many buildings housing several hundred persons.

OBITUARY

In the passing of Thomas Henry Reid, whose death occurred in the Moosomin General Hospital, Sunday, after a brief illness, Moosomin loses another of its highly respected and esteemed pioneers.

Born at Holstein, Ont. 72 years ago, Mr Reid came West in 1904 and settled in the district immediately south of Moosomin, where he farmed successfully till 1921, when he moved to Moosomin. A successful breeder of pure bred cattle, he was the possessor of one of the finest herds of Herefords in Eastern Saskatchewan.

A kindly, intelligent and hospitable man, a devoted husband and father, a good neighbor and staunch friend, he was highly esteemed by all who knew him, and his sudden death will be deeply mourned throughout the community.

Mr. Reid was married in 1894. Besides his widow he is survived by a son and a daughter, Carlyle Reid, of Moosomin, and Mrs. John Baskie, of Whitewood. A son predeceased him in 1904, at the age of three years.

The funeral service was held from the family residence, Main St., Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. A. E. Swanson, and interment was made in the South cemetery, Moosomin.

JUDGING COMPETITION

The boys' and girls' Judging Competition at the Canadian National Exhibition will be held on Wednesday, Sept. 5th. All Grey County boys or girls are eligible to attend provided that their entry is made previous to August 14th.

The entry fee of 50c must be forwarded either direct to the Secretary of the C. N. E., Toronto, or may be sent to the Grey County Branch, Department of Agriculture, Markdale, previous to August 14th.

Judging will include Heavy Horses, Dairy and Beef Cattle, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Roots, Grains, Fruit and vegetables for the boys but each boy can only judge one class.

The girls judge nutrition, which includes family menus and identification and Method of Cooking Meat, Clothing, embracing Dress Parade and Darning, and House Furnishings with Kitchen plans. Only one of these can be judged by the girls.
