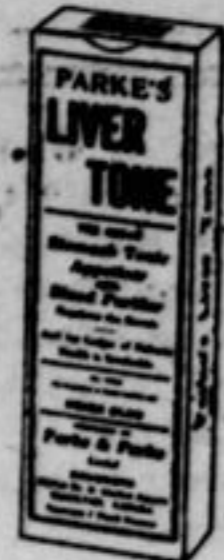

With the completion of the grand old bridge across Garafraxa St., bridge on west side to the foot of hill, the council will practically have their year's program of street improvements finished, as the \$1000 allotted for that work is about all spent. The cement walk is now open for use on the east side across the bridge and is an appreciated change after a year without any. The roads have been gravelled and graded in several places, and a new board sidewalk completed over Durham Road gully. General satisfaction is expressed among the ratepayers over the public improvements made by the present Council.

Pte. Ernest Lawson returned from overseas on Saturday to his old home at Varney, and is at present with his mother and sister, Mrs. Arch. Allan. Ernest looks in the best of health and was a year and a half in the American army seeing active service in the Argonne, France. He was with the American army of occupation at Coblenz, Germany and left that city for Canada on July 4th.

Mr. George McKeen has purchased the bus business and express delivery in town from Mr. John Whittaker, who has conducted it for several years. The former took possession on Monday of this week.

The local Hydro Commission, decided the town was getting off too easily in the cost of its street lighting and at a meeting last week increased the price of the street lamps 50 per cent or \$150 each per month instead of \$100. The town now pays \$1680 per year or \$140 monthly instead of \$93 for the illumination of the streets which will provide an annual increase of \$64 in the hydro revenue.

Miss Jessie Clark, of Aberdeen, a recent Normal graduate, has been engaged as teacher at S. S. No. 3, Bentinck (Vickers) at a good salary. With 63 pupils on the roll, Jessie has lots of work ahead in opening her teaching career but she will no doubt prove fully capable.
