DO YOU KNOW YOUR CANADA?
Interesting Things About Ontario
You May or May Not Know
Do you know what part of the world was the first to rise out of the ocean? What town is built in the form of a wheel? Where the first clear telephone transmission took place? Where the world's largest suspension bridge and the world's largest liftlock are located? What canal locks through more ships in eight months than the Suez and Panama canals do in a year?
In the formation of the world, the first land to rise from the ocean which covered almost its entire surface, was the height of land north of Lake Superior. At least so the geologists tell us. As the water receded more and more, a very high range of mountains formed around Hudson's Bay but in the Ice Age, when the glaciers spread down from the north the rock was ground down and distributed by the glaciers over what is now the Mississippi valley.
The town of Goderich is built on the lines of a huge wheel. The original plans were intended for Guelph and represented a large central octagonal place, with streets radiating from each angle of the octagon. Napoleon III's street arrangement of Paris may have been the initial inspiration for the idea.
The home of Alexander Graham Bell inventor of the telephone, was in Brantford and now serves as a telephone museum. According to one of Bell's letters the first clear, successful telephone message was sent along a line strung from Brantford to Paris, Ont., in 1867.
The Ambassador Bridge, connecting Sandwich, Ont., with Detroit, is the world's largest suspension span. Five lanes of traffic at one time may cross the bridge, branching out to twenty-eight lines at either terminus. Five thousand cars make the crossing at once, when the bridge is carrying its full capacity.
The liftlock at Peterboro is the largest of its kind in the world. The complete lift made by hydraulic pressure, something like an overgrown barber's chair, is 65 feet. Each lock measures 140 feet in length and 33 feet in width and may accommodate shipping with a draft of 9 feet 10 inches. The entire locking system is automatic.
Connecting Lakes Huron and Superior the five Sault Ste. Marie canals lock through more shipping in the short lake season on navigation than do both the Panama and Suez canals the whole year round. It is possible for the largest ocean liners built to pass through this great inland chain of canals.
The idea of Standard Time now used the world over, was first invented by Sanford Fleming in the old Institute's building on Bert Street in Toronto, now the headquarters of the Sons of England lodges.
When Governor John Graves Simcoe first settled in Toronto, he made his home in a tent that was originally the property of Captain Cook, discoverer of New Zealand. Governor Simcoe purchased the tent from the Cook family in England and brought it out to Canada, and set it up at the mouth of the Garrison Creek, what is now the foot of Bathurst Street.

The time was fast, 56 minutes and some seconds, but the distance is reported to be 2 laps short to the mile. Previous to this a three mile race was \$1.00, for purses of \$3, \$2 and \$1. Roy Vickers came in first, W. McDonald, who dropped out in the 5-mile here, second, and Doug. Brigham, of Allan Park, third.
A few lines in the Review last week was the means of tracing a sow that seems to have caught the prevailing marathon craze. None of your rink laps for her however, but straight away across country like the good old runner of Greece. Mr Geo. Hendry of the 7th con, Bentinck, had come to his place recently one of your lanky, snouty specimens of the Tamworth sow. He turned her in and was good to her and in a day or two rewarded his care by giving birth to 10 young porkers. Aware that somewhere she must have been missed, he made enquiries among his neighbors but found no owner. He then did the next most sensible thing—sent a few lines to the Review, which caught the eye of Mr. McRobb of the 16th con. Egremont, who was induced, though doubting to take the long trip of over 20 miles and found to his surprise that the animal was his.
