"The removal from Walkerton of the Elvidge family," says the Telescope, "will be regretted by their friends. Coming originally from Durham, Mr Elvidge has seen 19 years' service with the railway, marked by efficiency and courtesy."

Received their Sentence
Ralph Barber and John Innes, former Durham men, who were convicted at Toronto recently on five separate charges of burglary and theft, on garages in Durham, Flesheron and Meaford, were sentenced in York Co. police court to three months' determinate and six months' indeterminate at Ontario Reformatory. Each pleaded guilty to the charges laid against them.

WALKERTON HYDRO ANNOUNCES CUT IN RATES
Announcement has been made by the Walkerton Hydro Commission of a reduction in rates, the first since public ownership was instituted four years ago. Reduction is from 3.5c. to 3.3c. per kilowatt hour for the first 50 hours and from 2c. to 1 1/2c. for additional consumption. Commercial rates will be lowered from 3.5c to 3.3 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 100 hours.

Council Will Extend Full Cooperation for Reunion

Durham Council at their September session Tuesday night, unanimously voted to co-operate with the citizens and committee in every way possible to ensure the success of the Old Boys' Reunion next August. This was in response to Secy Willis' request, in which he asked the privileges of the Town Hall and streets for the event; also, which was granted.

Before the Council were samples of fire hose from three Companies. Mr. Thompson, representing the Dunlop Co. spoke at length regarding hose. Reeve Hunter thought Council should buy so much each year till up to requirements which was concurred in. 200 feet of Dunlop hose, Samson brand at \$1 per foot was ordered, with proper couplings included, and a shut-off nozzle also, costing \$20.10.

A letter from Chairman Ellis of Provincial relief, stated all relief recipients — families and individuals, must be registered before any relief is granted.

The County Rate for Durham will be \$4050, the same as last year. General accounts totalling \$443.34 and \$19.52 of relief accounts were passed.

Chairman McGowan of the Board of Works, reported that the Standard Paving Co. had inspected all town pavements laid five years ago and were willing to live up to guarantee by making all necessary repairs, to put them in good condition. They will do concrete work this week and the next.

The Council favored accepting Schutz and Sons offer to supply gravel delivered at 64c. a yard for use on streets. It was left with Board of Works to secure what is required.

Four tenders were received for laying new sidewalk in front of Ford Garage,—from George McKay, Howard McDonald, R. A. Blyth and W. J. McFadden. Council accepted the lowest tender, Geo. McKay's at \$96.40, and appointed Geo. McKechnie as spectator.
