the people. Her associates in Parliament termed the ginger group stood for what the people wanted and were more important members than any other 20 outside the cabinet.

Mackenzie King was lucky when he was Prime Minister from 1924-29 when times were good; now there is a greater swing against Bennett, than against King in 1930, she asserted. Bennett the past year, had done almost everything he said he'd never do—printed \$53,000,000 new money, spent \$40,000,000 on public works (in Tory ridings) set up Central Bank brought in Marketing act, farmer's debt adjustment act, and more changes in Bank act. But even this good legislation won't save him. The most terrible blunder Bennett made was not making Canadian money of equal or less value than Britain's, when Britain went off the gold standard. Australia did so and now they are out of the depression.

We've no lack of goods, we've more than ever before—far more than we have money. Too little money is Canada's dilemma. Hon. Mr. Cahane in 1933 we had \$922,000,000 less money than in 1929.

Agriculture is in an impossible position. The great causes of farm difficulties is too little money for volume of goods, tariffs, and loss of purchasing power. The condition of labor affects agriculture very much for if labor class is on relief, who is to buy the bulk of the farm products? "The fight for the common people must come from outside the major parties," she said. "If I thought I could have done as good work for the people in either of major parties, I would have joined them."

She landed Hepburn for his efforts to better conditions in Ontario, and Stevens for his stand against combines and big industries. She declared she would stand for absolute Govt. inspection and control over profits of big business, would try to bring in a tax on wealth, and tax inherited wealth. She advocated a great program of public works; to be financed by new money, and thought the day would come when Gov't. will build hydro lines to the homes of the farmers.

Miss Macphail believed money should be created and lent without interest by the Gov't, which must determine a price level for farm products. 95% of all money in Canada has no body—it comes through chartered bank loans—loaning money they haven't got. Bank loans exceed their cash deposits ten times.

"The best days the world has seen are almost here," she stated. "We're not far from the day when there will be some apportionment of the income between capital and labor."

She declared she was afraid only of the forces of reaction. She did not belong to C. C. F., but was strictly Independent. She was not a half Liberal nor had Liberal leanings, as had been charged, and she certainly was not a Conservative.

She intended to address 30 meetings throughout the riding this fall, but was not going to trim or quibble. She stood for definite principles, and expected strong efforts to defeat her next election, come when it may. "They (the major parties) don't want me in the House of Commons. They want people they can handle easily," she remarked, in concluding, stating her efforts would continue to better conditions for the people.
