Fine weather brought out an overflow crowd in the Hall, for the annual School Fair, of Egremont Tp., last Saturday. The Fairs are losing none of their popularity, judging by numbers of school children out, as well as their elders.

First in the day's event were the public speaking and singing contests in the hall. Inspector Pentland acting as chairman. The boys were missing in the speaking, but in girls' contest, Elva Bunston of No. 10, McRobb and Margaret of Mt. Forest; and Miss C. Hoeflin of Orchard.

In girls solo, the winners were 1st—Blanche Cowan of No. 4. Verna Eakett, No. 10; Marie Love, Irene Love, Lenore Watson, all of No. 11 school. For Boys' solo, Andrew Dingwall and Leonard Watson, both No. 11, were 1st and 2nd. All contestants had to sing the same solo, "Danny Boy." S.S. No. 13 took the prize for school chorus, being the only entry. They were good.

An interesting event was the presenting of the twelfth gold medal donated by the Women's Institute of Holstein to the pupil obtaining the highest marks at the Entrance exam writing in Holstein. Miss Harriette Wilton was the successful one this year. Mrs. McGuire and Mrs. Arnill made the presentation.

The schools lined up on the school grounds and marched to the Park, where five competed in the drills and parade. Inspector Pentland acting as judge. Points were given for marching, deportment, Strathcona drill and song, then summed up.

First place was won by No. 11—Miss Arlie Montgomery, teacher, who had 20 pupils on parade. Second went to No. 10—Miss Barker, teacher, and 21 pupils. No. 4 school, the smallest, with only 8 pupils, (Miss R. Wright, teacher) came third. U. No. 2 Orchard, (Miss McPherson, teacher) with 18 pupils was fourth and No. 9, (Miss M. Sharp, teacher) and 19 pupils fifth. The latter two schools were handicapped on account of having no song, losing the points thus awarded.

The exhibits were of a splendid quality and in plenty, especially in flowers, baking and vegetables.

**15 YEARS AGO**

From Review 17th Sept. 11 1919.

Will enlisted in the Cyclist Corps early in 1916 and upon proceeding to England transferred to the flying corps. He made an adept aviator and was in many combats on the Western Front. In the fall of 1917 while flying at the height of 2,000 feet, his plane was placed 'hors de combat,' but he was able to sufficiently control it to make an abrupt landing, but not without sustaining severe injuries, resulting in a period of many months in the hospital in England. Before armistice was signed he was again badly hurt and escaped further mishap. His many friends will be pleased to hear of his return and his adventures at the front.
