SUCCESSFUL FAIR AT HANOVER

The Hanover, Bentinck and Brant Agricultural Society's fall fair was held in Hanover Friday and drew a good crowd, in fact, it was much larger than last year. The weather was perfect. Joyes Brothers midway was on the grounds. The grandstand performance by the Canadian Cowboys Concert Co. attracted a large crowd.

The live stock exhibit was not as large as last year, though the entries were of good class. In the main building the exhibition of fancy goods was equal to the preceding year, as were the roots and flowers, but the fruits, especially apples, were away below normal. There was a good display of fowl of various kinds.

The results of the horse races were as follows: The 2.15 required three heats to decide. Derby Dan, owned by George Hillgartner, Chestley, won first money; Prince Grattan, Elmer Fritz, Hanover, second; Verney Boy, C. Moore, Listowel, third. The time was 2.02.

The 2.88 race was just a parade, there being only two heats with the horses coming in the same order each time: first, Jack Francis, E. Fritz, of Hanover; second, Louis Patch, Nell McQuarrie, Orangeville; third, Roy Grattan, Mr. Colvin, Teeswater.

CHARLES COOPER

The passing of Charles Cooper, of Dalesboro, came with such suddenness last Saturday afternoon that the whole district was shocked as it heard the news. Mr. Cooper had not been in good health for some months and went under an operation in Oxbow Hospital some days previous.

He had made splendid recovery and was in the best of spirits when, with but a few minutes warning, he died.

The late Charles Cooper was born at Hanover, Ont., September 1st, 67 years ago and thus died on his birthday. He went west in 1899 and for a number of years taught school in the West Carlyle School and later in the Greenhill school. Many of our prominent citizens still speak in glowing terms of his ability as a teacher and his influence upon their lives.

Twenty years ago he took up land and has farmed ever since in the Dalesboro district, and his home has been known far and wide for its hospitality and warm welcome to all comers. Mr. Cooper was a man of sterling character, and all that was best found in him a ready and enthusiastic advocate. He was a staunch Liberal and was willing at all times to speak of the policies he held so firmly. He was a warm-hearted and generous member of the United Church and had for a number of years, held honored position of elder.

There are left to mourn his loss his widow and two daughters residing at home on the farm, Misses Tannis and Margaret Cooper, and Mrs. Wesley Doty of Carlyle; also two brothers, John of Hanover and Alex. of Galt; and four sisters, Mrs. A. Derby of Durham, Mrs. J. Hughes of Didsbury, Alberta, and Mrs. H. Ford and Miss J. Cooper of Hanover.

The funeral service was held from the farm home on Tuesday afternoon where a short private service was held, followed by a public service in Moose Creek United Church conducted by the Rev. T. H. Sendall. The choir led the singing, and a duet was sung by Mrs. M. Purse and Mrs. W. Nolan of Carlyle. In his address Mr. Sendall, speaking on 'A Christian Conqueror' paid a tribute to the life and character of the deceased and said that life was richer, sweeter and more worthwhile because he had lived and made so outstanding a contribution to the life of the district.

The large gathering present was an eloquent tribute to the esteem in which Mr. Cooper was held. Among those present from a distance were Mrs. H. Ford, Miss J. Cooper and John Cooper of Hanover; Mr. and Mrs. T. Cook, Herbert, Sask.; and Mrs. E. Whitman, Arcola. The body was laid to rest in Alameda cemetery, the pall bearers being Messrs H. Brandon, R. A. Robertson, J. Cooper, W. Doty, T. Cook and Norman Wallace.

Publication last week of figures showing that Hanover's population showed an increase of 50 over the previous year, with the total population now placed at 3,056, is another indication that this town has done the unusual, as far as population figures are concerned.
