Accounts totalling \$674.44 were passed also \$15.59 relief accounts. The acting mayor read a letter from Board of Ry. Commissioners re- lieving the C.P.R. of responsibility for maintaining fences along their right-of-way through Durham, mile 16.9 to 16.7.

Coun. McKechnie reported he was well pleased with condition of the streets, now that they had been newly gravelled where necessary throughout town, down to the town line as well. The gravel is of good quality and has made greatly im- proved streets. Discussion took place over the street sweeper cleaning up- on leaves on Bruce St quite fre- quently. Council deemed once a week would suffice.

Coun. Duffield reported new fire hose had arrived in good shape, but connection and nozzle tips were wrong. Adjustments are being made. He suggested having interior of fire hall whitewashed next winter. On motion of McKechnie-Duffield, the Property Com. was authorized to proceed, in co-operation with the I. O. O. F. E., to have toilets, etc. instal- led in basement of the town hall, the work to be done as cheaply as possible. The I.O.O.F.E. are generous- ly donating \$200 towards this im- provement and the Council thought it well to have the work proceeded with in the coming months, in re- dress for the Reunion celebration next summer. The treasurer's report showed over \$4050 of the current year's taxes now paid.

"Macphail Day" at Robert Lawson's Grove

Friends and Admirers of Canada's Only Woman Member Presented Her with Handsome Quilt.

Robert Lawson's grove north of town was the mecca of a unique as- semblage on Saturday afternoon of last week. Though a candidate who had received the official nomination of her party, was the centre of interest for the gathering, there was not a breath of suspicion of political "pot-boiling". Indeed the event rather savored of a picnic, where anything so indicative of an approaching elec- tion was far from thought of or dis- cussed. The gathering was a tribute to South Grey's lady member, Miss Agnes Macphail, M. P. and while receiving many evidences of good will and appreciation of her work in the House since her first entry in 1921, we feel safe in saying, nothing quite touched her heart so much. For it was an affair of the heart.

Just where the idea originated of presenting Miss Macphail with a quilt made by one of her constituents, is more or less of a mystery. But the idea grew and grew and the U.F.W.O. Clubs of South Grey found the work a labor of love. To Miss Walter Fer- guson of Mt. Forest, formerly near Dromore, was accorded the honor of making this gift from Miss Macphail's admirers of South Grey. It proved to be a work of art, and something that is not often seen.

Mrs Robert Lawson, president of Rocky Saugren Women's Club, kind- ly offered her grounds for the event and presentation on Saturday last. On this day in question, the admir- ers of the male sex as well turned out in large numbers. For a further account of the doings of the after- noon, we quote Dorothea Deans of the "Sun Times":

The host Mr. Lawson, spoke in genial welcome when the program opened on the flower-bordered lawns early in the afternoon. Mrs Wm. H. Rogers of Holstein was then called upon to act as chairman of the after- noon, fulfilling this duty with a grave and delicious humor and wel- coming the many timely quips tossed from the side-lines. A number of en- tertaining features were contribut- ed. Mr. William Ramage of Priceville, veteran choir leader led in com- munity singing, and also contributed an excellent vocal solo. Mrs. Neil McLean of Durham and Mrs David Lamb of Bentinck gave readings and Miss Adams of Egremont vocal solos.

Mrs. Rogers expressed the hap- piness it gave the women and also the men of South East Grey to have "our member" present and invited Miss Macphail to the platform. The address of appreciation, high com- mendation and loving regards which accompanied the gift to Miss Macphail was read by Mrs John Hill of Boothville, and Mrs Walter Ferguson of Mount Forest, who designed and made the beautiful quilt on behalf of the women of South East Grey pre- sented the token. Miss Macphail in feelingly receiving the quilt and removing the wrappings, so that it could be held aloft and its artistry admired, said that the gift was par- ticularly timely, as she had just com- pleted the renovation of her bed- room to form a study as well. The goodwill motivating the gift meant more to her than it possibly could have meant any other time during her thirteen years as South East Grey's representative, said Miss Macphail.

Mr. F. Oliver expressed the ap- preciation of the people for the work she has done in their behalf. Stead- fast and courageous, able and elo- quent in all her work, an expression of approval of her services by those present was given. A selection by Egremont's poet J. A. Ferguson was read by the chairman Mrs W. H. Rogers, very appropriate to the occasion. She filled her position in the chair, very cleverly and facetiously as well. We hope that under the lovely folds of this beautiful work of art, so well done, not a stitch astray, straight and regular in its decora- tions, our clever member may have many pleasant dreams without a trace of nightmare.

Liberals Choose Dr. Hall on Fourth Ballot

Plenty of Candidates to Choose from.—12 Nominated

By a final vote of 204, to 197 for W. E. Harris, barrister of Markdale, Dr. W. A. Hall, sitting M. P. for South Bruce, was nominated by a monster Liberal Convention here on Tuesday, to be the first Liberal candi- date in the newly formed riding of Grey-Bruce.

The Town Hall was jammed to the doors. Over 400 delegates stood on hand and those unable to find room in upper hall, assembled and voted in the lower hall. No lar- ger or more enthusiastic convention of Liberals was ever known here, revealing that they are eager to contest the riding with Miss Macphail, M. P., and whoever the Con- servative nominee may be.

President Dr. T. H. Sneath first called for nominations for a candi- date and twelve were quickly put forward: Dr. Hall, Walkerton; W. E. Harris, Markdale; D. T. Wright, Dundalk; D. A. D. McAllister, Dundalk; J. L. Lembke, Sullivan; J. A. Paterson, Hanover; J. A. Johnson, Midway; Dr. J. A. McArthur, Mark- dale; Otto Klein, Walkerton; Dr. T. H. Sneath, Durham; Col. Fraser Hunter, M. P. P., Toronto; Dr. W. Porterfield, Chesley.

The nominator of each was given opportunity to speak, and several did so. Chas. Witham, Hanover, said when prospects were almost hopeless no candidate could be secured, but now with bright chances, "Dr. Hall was the logical choice. Dr. Hall of Walkerton, advocated Mr. Harris strongly, intimating that Dr. Hall had let organization crumble.

Of the candidates, Dr. Porterfield was standing; Dr. Sneath, Otto Klein Dr. J. A. McArthur, J. A. Johnson, Dr. McAllister, withdrew, also J. A. Paterson, after strong support of Dr. Hall. A letter from Col. Hunter was read, declining to stand if nomi- nated.

J. L. Lembke said he had formerly been Conservative, had supported Miss Macphail, but who had Liberals given him to vote for lately? A wise man would change his mind, and he was here to win the convention.

D. T. Wright said he never was anything but Liberal. Liberals had elected U.F.O. candidate, and be- cause of this, that party should have no candidate in the field today. Dr. Hall wanted the honor of be- ing first to beat Miss Macphail. She is C.C.F., and always voted with C. C.F. He related his life history, and victories in Bruce.

W. E. Harris said Miss Macphail's vote must be cut in half for Liberals to win out. She does not now represent those principles she did in 1930. Independent members can do nothing for us. If chosen he would try to get King and Hepburn here to support him. Anything a candidate says a- gainst Miss Macphail personally will lose him votes; he must attack her policies.

Five names went to the ballot, and four ballots were taken, in charge of Mr. Marshall, of Elderslie, brother of Hon. Duncan Marshall. The low- est retired after each ballot. First one resulted: Hall 159, Harris 126, Lembke 53, Wright 51, Porterfield 17. On the second, Hall had 168 votes, Harris 144, Lembke 43, Wright 40. Third ballot saw Hall 183, Harris 180, Lembke 42, and fourth Hall 204, Har- ris 197, whereupon Mr. Harris mov- ed Dr. Hall's nomination be made unanimous. Dr. Hall thanked the convention and assured them he would put forth his best efforts.

F. G. Sanderson, M. P. for South Perth, Liberal Whip, was speaker of the day between ballots. He eulo- gized Dr. Hall's worth in commit- tee and in caucus. Hepburn, he said was carrying out his promises to the people—what a contrast to Bennett! After his election, Bennett called a special session and raised the tariff, which had a lot to do with the de- pression since. The bye-elections serv- ed notice on Gov't. that public sen- timent was strongly against it. He concluded with an exposure of Ben- nett's broken promises.

Dr. Sneath, President Durham; D. Forrester, Vice-Pres.; Paisley; W. E. Harris, Sec'y-Treas.; provisional of- ficers appointed were confirmed by the Convention. Proposed by D. T. Wright a res- olution of unbounded faith and con- fidence in leaderships of Premier Hepburn and Mackenzie King was unanimously carried.

Chilly Brand of Weather for Durham Fall Fair

The bakery department was the mecca for many and the names of Mrs. W. Clark, Mrs. McIlraith, Mrs. N. Whit- more, Mrs. John Hamilton Mrs Davis vied with each other for supremacy. The Women's Institute special prize for an assortment of baking, went to Mrs. Will Clark. The fancy work de- partment was also the admiration for many, and must have caused the judges much thought. Mrs. Honeyman, had a wonderful mat on display and Mrs. Thos. Brown had the red tick- et for her embroidered bedspread.

MOTHER'S ALLOWANCE

PAYMENTS DECREASE

A slight decrease in the number of mothers benefiting from provincial allowances is shown by the Septem- ber report, when 34 fewer drew al- lowances and there was a drop in the expenditure of \$3,619.

This is ascribed to children leaving school and going to work, their moth- ers no longer being eligible for pen- sions.

The number of children of bene- ficiaries on the list approximates 20,000. In August there were 7,025 mothers who received \$266,253, and in September 6,991 who drew \$262,634.

OLD-AGE PENSIONS

INCREASED BY 309

In September 309 more persons in the province received old age pen- sions than in August, according to a statement made by the Ontario public welfare department to-day. In August the number of pensioners was 47,342 and the amount paid to them was \$863,259, and in September the number was 47,651, the expendi- ture being \$864,017.
