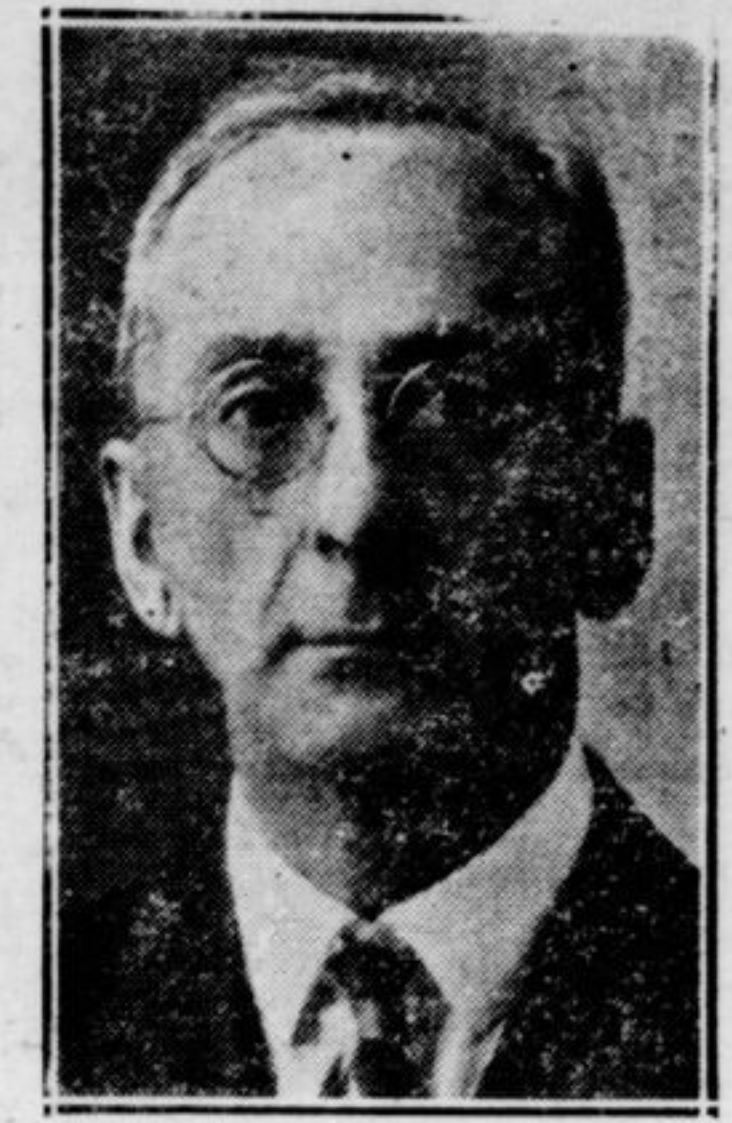
Leaving Friday, Mr. Miller will be accompanied by his wife. A son, Dick is now a student at the University of Toronto.
