

15 YEARS AGO

Durham War Veterans met on Wednesday and elected officers for the ensuing year as follows: Hon. Pres., Miss Jessie Munro; Pres., B. Willis, (acclamation); 1st Vice Pres., Anson Lloyd; 2nd Vice Pres., Frank McIlraith; Secy, J. L. Stedman, (acclamation); Treas., Thos. A. Lauder; Executive Com., C. Wolfe, W. Thompson, Fred Kelly, Robert Lindsay. The boys have arranged for a grand ball in the hall on Nov. 7th, for which the London Harpers will supply the music.

An organization meeting of all interested in retaining the rink in Durham was held in McLachlan's store Friday evening. It was the unanimous decision to proceed with the formation of a local company who would purchase the rink for \$4000. Shares valued at \$25 each were decided upon. P. Gagnon was elected chairman of the meeting; P. Ramage Secy; J. A. Rowland Treas. and J. McLachlan, J. Snell, W. McGowan, P. Gagnon, F. Irwin, J. S. McIlraith, J. H. Hunter, and Dr. Pickering a Committee to push the stock lists.

South Grey spoke in no uncertain tone for it unseated Dr. Jamieson, by far the strongest candidate that any party has had for many years, and elected Dr. George M. Leeson by 953 majority. Dr. Jamieson has been defeated by a force rather than by an individual and in saying this we have no intention of belittling Dr. Leeson's success but heartily congratulate him on his great victory, a victory for which he gives the credit to the loyal support of his brother farmers and to not a few in the towns and villages also.

Five of Toronto's eight seats have elected Liberals and by large majorities. This is both a revelation and a revolution in Tory Toronto, and they weren't farmers either, these voters.

An interesting function took place Tuesday evening at Allan's School, Egremont, when there was a dual unveiling of the honor roll containing the names of seven young men of the district and who had enlisted, and that of the pictures of two who gave the supreme sacrifice, Lelut. Thomas Allan and Cecil Davis. Two other pictures of boys who had seen active service at the front, since returned, also adorned the walls, those of Jas. Barbour and John Davis. To Mrs. P. Lawrence, Durham, was given the honor of unveiling the roll, while Roy's Smith of Dromore and Hardy unveiled the pictures.
