This Tuesday morning only one subject is in our mind in this locality, the sad passing of Mrs Wesley Heard and two little daughters in their home in Guelph, last Saturday, Nov. 10th. Great was the shock that came over the phone about 7:30 Saturday evening, to the old Heard home here, a strange voice saying that Mrs. Heard and their two little girls had died that afternoon in the bathroom while having their customary Saturday bath. Mr. Heard who was at work, came home at night, found the house in darkness, wondered, and making search, found on the bathroom floor Mrs Heard; on either side of her a little girl. The children were undressed, apparently just out of the bath. Beryl, aged 9, showed signs of life, was rushed to the hospital by the doctor but in a few minutes she had passed on. Mr and Mrs Ed Heard and Clarence Harrison, a cousin, immediately motored to Guelph to be with Wes, and help with the arrangements. The bodies were taken to undertaking parlours, and there dressed for burial, then shipped by train on Monday morning to Holstein, where Colin McMillan undertaker, received them and conveyed them in two hearses to the old Heard home at Salem about 3 p.m. Monday.

Mrs Heard was Allie Harrison, a daughter of Mrs Harrison and the late Jones Harrison, of North-East Egremont. About ten years ago she was married to Wesley Heard and they took up homemaking on lot 14 con. 15, Proton. For a few years in the wake of the boom, they lived in Detroit, coming back to the farm. They lived here until just two months ago when they moved to Guelph, where Mr. Heard had secured a job to his liking. Sunday November the 4th they spent with mother and brother at the old home here, all in the best of spirits, and well satisfied with their new home and surroundings. But alas how sudden the change! Those three lives so quickly snuffed out. Mrs Heard was 32 years of age, Beryl 9 Ruthie 5 years old.

There are left to mourn, husband, father, both mothers and a host of friends on both sides, for whom much sympathy is expressed by everyone in the community. They were well-known and respected by us all who have known them throughout their short lives. Surely we all may wonder why, yet we know that God watches over us all, and we only can submit to His will.

The funeral held on Tuesday afternoon in the church was the largest and most sympathetic gathering ever held here. Friends from Toronto, Detroit, and Guelph were present. 25 YEARS AGO
Taken from the Review file, Nov. 11, 1909

In comparison with some adjacent towns and villages, Durham was rather a quiet burg during the Halloween period. Hanover and Elmwood, both had main streets blocked with anything movable, and some property damaged. Six constables were sworn in here, to assist Chief Carson.

In connection with the razing of the old British Hotel stables it is interesting to know that Mr Geo. Turnbull of this town was at the raising of it in 1856, fifty-three years ago. The framer was a William Thomas of Bentinck. Mr Turnbull would like to know if there are any others alive who can recall that early "raising," at which there was something stronger than local option beer according to the custom.

Today, Wednesday, Priceville is laying to rest her foremost citizen of many years, Mr. John McArthur, who died, Monday at the age of 60 years, 7 months after an illness of about half a year.
