## OBITUARY

### MRS. DUNCAN CALDER

Passing peacefully away at the home of her daughter at Clinton St., Toronto, Sunday evening last, Mrs D. Calder leaves her family a fragrant memory of a life well lived and a purpose accomplished. She had achieved the great age of 96 years, and to the last her memory and other faculties of sight and hearing were not denied her, thus enjoying the evening years of her life. Over 15 years ago she fell on the floor of her home, breaking her hip bone; since that time she has been unable to walk alone, only the past two weeks however has she been bedfast, the trouble being old people's pneumonia.

Mrs Calder was born in Bonnie Scotland, at Islay, in the far-gone year 1838, carrying the maiden name of Janet McNab. Here she grew up, married and her eldest son born, before emigration took place to Canada. This is now about 70 years ago. She was one of the pioneers of Grey, living for many years with husband and family on 14th con., Egremont, near Fairbairn. Advancing years coming on, she has made her home the past 13 years in Toronto with her daughter, Mrs. Campbell, where she has received every consideration from her family, as well as loving attention from the rest of her family. Her husband predeceased her 25 years ago, and one son Alex 25 years ago. There are nine surviving children, who mourn her loss today: Peter of Alta., Neil, Winnipeg; Archie and John, Egremont; Misses Kate and Janet Calder, Toronto; Mary, Mrs. D. Campbell, Toronto; Martha, Mrs. Ar-nold Noble, and Mrs Robert Noble, both of Durham. There are also 14 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Brother and sister of deceased still reside in Scotland.

A service was held from her daughter's residence in Toronto, Monday evening, conducted by Rev. Mr. McEwen of St. Paul's Presbyterian church, Toronto. The following day, Tuesday, the remains were brought to Mount Forest cemetery for interment.

The home of Mr and Mrs Adam Anderson, Edge Hill, was saddened on Friday morning last, when their son, Leslie Weir, an invalid for some years, died after a brief illness, at the age of 21 years. An interesting experiment in Group Discussion on economic and ethical questions was carried on in Hanover last Saturday. Thirty-five people representing three counties and many occupations, met in social and intellectual fellowship in afternoon and evening sessions.

After opening remarks by Miss A. Macphail, the Rev. Wm. Howey of Owen Sound outlined the different economic systems which have been and led the discussion on social and economic organization.

"We are told that death and taxes are sure," he said, "but there is one other thing of which we are sure and that is change."

## 16 Car Accident Cases At Fall Assizes

When Mr. Justice G. W. McFarland opened the fall sittings of the Supreme Court in Owen Sound Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 20, he was presented with a pair of white gloves, for there are no criminal cases on the docket. His Honor did not have an idle time, however, for there were no less than 24 civil actions set down for trial, 11 of these cases being jury cases with the remaining 13 set down as non-jury cases.

This was the first visit of Mr. Justice McFarland to Owen Sound since his elevation to the Supreme Court bench, but he is far from a stranger, as he was the officer in command of the 147th Battalion during the Great War days.

A feature of the docket for this week's session of the Supreme Court was the number of cases arising out of automobile accidents. All eleven of the jury cases are connected with accidents and in addition five of the 13 non-jury cases are automobile accident cases.

The first of the Jury cases is that of John Carty of Owen Sound, an infant, by his next friend, Elizabeth Carty versus Bert Lawrence, Chas. B. Lawrence and O. J. J. Knoebel. The first two defendants are from Durham while Mr. Knoebel is from Chicago. The plaintiff is seeking \$10,000 damages as a result of injuries alleged to have been received when he was a passenger in a car driven by Bert Lawrence and owned by Chas Lawrence, which is said to have collided with a car owned and driven by Knoebel on May 27, 1934. Middlebro and Scott are acting for the plaintiffs, Campbell Grant, Walkerton for Bert and Charles Lawrence, and Fasken, Rober-son, Aitchison, Pickup and Calvin of Toronto for Knoebel. Later—This case never came to trial, as previous settlement was made out of court.

Four cases arise out of an accident said to have occurred Sept. 14, 1934. Patrick Horrigan of Ayrton is suing Stanley H. Smith and William Horrigan, otherwise known as Brother Arnold, for \$7,000. Patrick Horrigan is said to have been a passenger in a car driven by William Horrigan when it and a truck driven by Smi h collided. Dennis and Mary Ryan are seeking \$3,000 and \$5,000 respectively in another case arising out of the same accident. Mary Horrigan seeks \$5,000 while Ellen Heeney asks a similar amount. Phelan and Robertson of Toronto are acting for the plaintiffs in these actions, whilst Fasken, Robertson, Aitcheson and Co. and Shaver, Paulin and Branscombe, both Toronto firms, will represent the defendants.

Lloyd Garbutt of Owen Sound and Harry E. Conley of Detroit are suing Clarence Fenton and Hazel Vera Fenton of Holstein, Garbutt seeking \$2,500 and Conley \$5,000. In a counter-claim Clarence Fenton asks \$1,000 and Hazel Vera Fenton \$1,500. The case arises out of another automobile accident. J. F. P. Birnie, K. C., is acting for the plaintiff and F. G. MacKay for the defendant.

The negative side was taken by Alx Tobin and Frank Ritchie, the affirmative side by Boyce Howell and Bill Hadfield, the negative side winning. Mr. Gowdy closed with prayer.
