Injured in Fall
After nicely recovering from his severe illness of a few months ago, Mr. Cliff Elvidge received a severe shock and bruises from falling down a trap-hole in the floor, in the darkness at the Public Library. Workmen had been at work during the day installing a hot air furnace there, and had left the register off the hole in floor where it belonged. This was at the end of the counter. Mr. Elvidge last Saturday night in his duties as Librarian had the outer lights on and was walking around the counter as usual to switch on the inner lights, when he stepped into the opening. His other leg held him up, but he fell against the counter, bumped his head and twice lost consciousness lying there, until patrons coming to Library found him prostrate. His leg is firm and swollen near the hip, and it is hoped there are no internal injuries. He was taken back to his home later in evening. Bentinck Returns Present Stirring Municipal Contest Council By Acclamation In Glenelg Township

The somewhat expected "lively" nomination of Bentinck electors at Lamash last Friday failed to materialize. A jammed schoolhouse awaited the year's report of their municipal rulers, and while many present scented an election in the offing, none is to be held next Monday, as the long list of candidates sifted down to an acclamation for the present Council by 9 p.m. Saturday night. The 1935 Council will see no change in personnel, and will be: Reeve—Dougald J. McDonald for his 10th year. Deputy Reeve—Geo. H. Magwood. Councillors—Chas. Bailey, John Fred Torry.

When Clerk Chittick closed nominations at 2 p.m. he had 4 names for Reeve, 5 for Deputy and 8 for Councillors. These were: Reeve—D. J. McDonald, A. C. McDonald, Geo. Magwood, Herb W. Hunt; Deputy Reeve—Geo. Magwood, Chas. Bailey, Fred Torry, John Wells, Alex Hopkins; Councillors—Henry Schultz, John Wells, Chas. Bailey, Fred Torry, Mark Mervyn, Jas. McDougall, Wm. G. McCulloch, John Walsh.

Reeve D. J. McDonald was pleased to see the great interest taken by the ratepayers, and made sympathetic reference to the death of former Deputy R. Grierson, and his loyalty to the township. New expenditures this year were \$450 for relief and also hospital accounts, of which township and Co. each pay half.

He went in detail into Co. bridge expenditures. There was a time when wooden bridges were all right, but they won't fill the bill now. For the Torry bridge the engineer had stated to close the road or build new bridge. For the new one, the Govt. gave 5% increase in subsidy to 45% and the bridge cost \$6,500 in all or \$3,600 to the tp. With increased subsidy and 5 year debentures, it means that the tp. in 5 years has the new bridge paid for at extra cost of only \$300 a year.

The new Camp Creek bridge cost the tp. \$1477. This Dept. of Highways built, as old one was too narrow and tp. bought old bridge through contractor Blyth.

The McFarlane bridge had 20 ft. span and was floored with concrete. Price was cheap—\$1,250 or less, actual cost. The steel culvert on 8th, cost less than \$250, and it was now a permanent bridge.

He upheld crushing of gravel for roads as in the best interests of the tp. This year tenders had been asked. Touching on County matters, he stated a great deal more paving was done in Co. this year. He expected County would have to pay full 20% of cost, as he did not expect new Govt. would assume full cost this year.

The reeve said he had intention of retiring this year after 9 years in big chair, but two other candidates had asked him to stay, and he would if electors desired it. He had made mistakes, but they were not intentional, and he would go out of municipal life with a clear conscience.

Dep. reeve G. H. Magwood, after paying tribute to the late Mr. Grierson's courage and backbone when in Council, launched into the travelling question, which he said was the bone of contention. The Council went out to fix roads where needed worst, and could not be moving crusher around much, as it costs \$100.00 to move it. All gravel should be crushed; it could be screened but only sand was left, which alone was not sufficient. In Bentinck we couldn't grade suitably and started crushing to get better roads. Roads were deplorable in No. 1 division (north-east corner of tp.). No. 2 little better, No. 3 with better drainage had best roads; No. 4 division, south part was better than No. 3, but north part needed repairs.

Two tenders for crushing and hauling with trucks were received—no one tendered for teams. There was no gravel in North (where road work was done) for crushing so Edge's pit the only suitable one was used. They accepted lowest (Schutz) tender of 65 1/2¢ per yard for gravel hauled, levelled and crushed, a most reasonable figure. It cost 74¢ yd. last year. Road work costs on a \$1,000 assessment was only 55¢. Hauling including gravel cost \$3.875 last year; this year hauling bill was \$1793 and \$1,571 crushing. They saved \$974 a year, \$811 on gravel alone. Over 13% Reeves Riley and Council in by acclamation.

Interest was maintained at a high pitch at one of the liveliest township nominations ever held in the old Tp. Hall, Glenelg, last Friday, and on several occasions word battles were staged. Reeve Angus A. MacArthur was in the thick of it, exreeve Brodie being his assailant on one hand, and Coun. A. McCuaig on the other. The Reeve gave a good account of his stewardship, however, and will probably be returned for second term. Thos. J. Brodie, who last year was defeated after several years as reeve, by Mr. MacArthur is out to capture the seat from him, and it promises to be a real contest. There will also be a race for the four seats as Councillors, by five raepayers: Jno. Newell and Arch. McCuaig of the present Council, and Clarence Robinson, Ed. Sullivan and Eric Eyre, all new entrants.

Two of the present Council are not standing for re-election—Sam Wright, a veteran of several years, and John McKechnie, Glenroaden, who has served a couple years. In the absence of Clerk H. H. Macdonald, in Toronto, Treasurer W. J. Ritchie was in the chair and received nominations.

For Reeve, there were four nominations—A. A. MacArthur, T. J. Brodie, John McGirr and Geo. Whitmore. The latter two did not qualify. Eleven were nominated as councillors, as follows: John Newell, Arch. McCuaig, Ed. Sullivan, Clarence Robinson, Eric Eyre, S. Wright, John McKechnie, John McGirr, Frank Dorsey, W. R. Jack, Jos. Crutchley. The last six declined to enter the contest.

Voting takes place next Monday, Dec. 3rd, and as Glenelg is staging the only election in this locality on this date, the results will be watched with interest.
