**REPLACING FRUIT TREES**  
Owing to the extreme killing of fruit trees in the district, the matter of securing club orders of fruit trees was discussed at the meeting of the representatives of all Fair Boards in Grey and Bruce, held recently at Paisley. At that time it was decided something should be done.

To this end all farmers requiring fruit should get in touch with the President or Secretary of their local Agricultural Society or their Agricultural Representative and discuss the matter with them. Special rates are always accorded club orders.

The killing of trees in Grey County has been a most serious matter. Many farmers who grew their own fruit find that the greater percentage of their orchard is gone. Now wishing to replace these, they are looking for assistance. Your Agricultural Society is ready to help and your Grey County Agricultural Representative offers his assistance. Remember however that early orders are the most likely to be filled.

**MAXWELL HORSE CURED OF LOCK JAW ATTACK**

A young lad of Goderich was recently cured from an attack of tetanus or lock jaw, one of the very few cases in which those who contract the disease recover. But Dr. J. P. Ottewill V.S., of Flesherton reports to us that he recently had the case of lock jaw in a valuable horse owned by Mr Wm Seeley of Maxwell, which fully recovered and today is taking its place in the farm work.

For two days the animal had been ailing and when Dr. Ottewill was called on Sunday its jaws were locked and it was unable to swallow. It also had difficulty in walking owing to the contraction of the muscles. A phone call to Toronto that evening brought 5,000 units of tetanus serum by Monday noon and these were at once injected into the animal. Two days afterward an additional 5,000 units were given and the animal was then showing signs of improvement, and before it was fully recovered 30,000 units of the tetanus serum had been used.

It is very rarely that either man or animal recovers from an attack of lock jaw, after it has secured a firm setting on its victim. Mr. Seeley is real pleased with the progress the horse made to recovery, all through the progress of modern science in the treatment of disease.
