IN LINE FOR THE WARDENSHIP OF GREY COUNTY

With the retirement of Warden J. L. Taylor of Osprey from municipal life at the close of the year, interest centres on who the new presiding officer for 1935, will be a County Council. It is an unwritten rule, yet fairly strictly adhered to, that with 16 townships and 10 towns and villages in the County, rural Reeves be given the honor for two successive years, then an urban Reeve. Since ex-Warden A. Bell of Durham was in office, Bentinck's Reeve D. J. MacDonald and Reeve Taylor of Osprey have occupied the big chair, and as an urban Warden, Markdale's Reeve, J. C. Mercer, appears the likely choice for 1935.

ONE BIG CITY AT WINDSOR

The amalgamation of four border municipalities into a new and greater Windsor has been announced in a communication from Premier Hepburn. Briefly forecasting an unprecedented governmental move, the prime minister said: "Government legislation will come down at next session of parliament, welding Windsor, Walkerville, East Windsor and Sandwich into a city of more than 100,000 population. The new Windsor will come into being, July 1, 1935. As constituted at present, said the premier, four municipal governments are flourishing extravagantly side by side, "like chain stores at a busy corner."

TOO MANY LAWMAKERS MEANS TOO MANY SPENDERS

The United States 8,158 lawmakers have recently been reduced by 83. Arthur Brisbane tells what happened at the last election. "The State of Nebraska, at the suggestion of Senator Geo. W. Norris, wiped out its state senate, with 33 members, and its state house of representatives, with 100 members, substituted for both a single body, "unicameral" legislature one single house of 50 members. "Consolidating two legislative bodies into one and lopping off the public payroll \$3 from a total of 133, is a good step in the direction of reducing the national, state, city and county payroll armies of tax devouring officials." Canada has 881 lawmakers, which is more than there are in any of the following countries: Japan, with 67,000,000 people; Netherlands, 8,000,000; Poland, 32,000,000; Portugal, 7,000,000; Australia, 7,000,000; Sweden, 6,000,000; Argentina, 15,000,000; Greece, 6,000,000; South Africa, with 7,000,000 people. We do not need more than 10 to 30 legislators in any one province; nor more than 100 at Ottawa. Electing all the others merely lets us in for that much extra spending. —Financial Post.

BRITISHERS WIN NOBEL PRIZES

On Monday two Britons were awarded the 1933 and 1934 Nobel prizes for their contributions to world peace. Arthur Henderson received the 1934 prize for his work as president of the disarmament conference and Sir Norman Angell, famous British publicist, the 1933 award, which was not given last year, for his writings against war. Henderson's selection was unofficially announced Saturday. The award is a double triumph for the British Labour movement. Henderson is a leader of the party's right wing, and Angell has served as a Labor M.P. Awarding of the 1933 prize to Sir Norman Angell was unexpected in many quarters. Both awards were, however received with universal approval. Henderson has drawn universal attention by his undeviating pursuance of the aims, set forward when the disarmament conference was convoked at Geneva and his unwilling-

ness to let it collapse. Sir Norman Angell, whose book "The Great Illusion" before the war forecast with considerable accuracy the forces driving the world towards catastrophe, has written for years on behalf of peace. The awards were about \$40,000 each.

Looking forward to 1936, when a township reeve will probably be selected, there is no more logical choice than Reeve Angus A. MacArthur of Glenelg. Glenelg's turn for the honors is long overdue, as it was in 1895, forty years ago that the last warden from that township was elected, the late Mr. George Binnie. When 1935 rolls past, Mr. MacArthur will have had two years in the Council. He is a ready speaker and debater, a good mixer, and is well qualified for the highest County office. The township electors showed their confidence in him by giving him a banner majority and if he stays with it we have no doubt his fellow-reeves will place him in the Warden's chair.

YOUNG MAN AND HIS PROBLEMS

Many young men today must be finding time heavy on their hands although fortunately there are signs that their services will be more frequently in demand than at present. Young men find that apparently there is no work in sight in the sense of paid occupations. They have left schools full of hope and vigor and have trained in anticipation of securing work but little thought has been taken to training for leisure. But, and we want to stress this point, even a period of unemployment provides opportunities for self-development. Remember that your fathers who developed this country did not wait for opportunities; they made them. Literally they dug a living out of the earth—the primary source of all wealth. We make the following suggestions: 1. Use your abundant spare time to improve on your studies; perfect yourselves in those that you think may some day be of use; and take additional courses by mail or otherwise with a view to continued self-improvement. 2. Don't be afraid of books. Map out a course of reading—technical and cultural. This will improve your training and enrich your vocabulary. Moreover, a wide course of reading will from time to time suggest ideas that you may be able to turn to practical use. 3. If you cannot secure employment plan to start a business for yourselves. Recently the writer made a survey of a locality and found that at least 10 important businesses were unrepresented and this in an area inhabited by seventy thousand. 4. Don't be afraid of taking an active part in community services. By doing this you will help and inspire others; you will take your mind off your troubles of unemployment; you will make valuable personal contacts through which you may even hear of positions; you will develop your personalities. 5. Beware of yielding to temptations and bad habits that may breed in a period of enforced idleness. Employ yourselves even without pay by taking an active part in any legitimate activities that may present themselves.—Ex.
