OBITUARY

CHARLES G. LAWRENCE

In the death of Mr. Chas. G. Lawrence on Monday evening, Durham and vicinity loses a most highly respected and widely-known citizen. Always a hearty and robust man all his life until recently, he was taken to Durham hospital on the 19th of January, a little over a week previous to his passing, where he underwent an operation for an inward growth. It was successfully removed but he gradually grew weaker, suffering much pain.

The deceased was a native of Glenelg Township, born 76 years ago next May on the farm now occupied by Prosper Porter. When 4 or 5 years of age his parents moved to Hutton Hill in Bentinck, on the former Langrill farm, and here he grew to young manhood. When about 21 years old, he purchased the Jacob Lumley farm just west of Hutton Hill, and this was his home almost his entire married life. Four years ago he left the farm to his son Howard, and moved to a newly-built house on Albert St. Durham.

Deceased was first wedded to Miss Charlotte Hutton, who died in young womanhood. Four sons were born to them: George, John and Ed. of Paradise Valley, Alta., and Wm. Grandview, Man. Thirty-eight years ago he married Miss Lydia Noble, who survives him, with two sons and 3 daughters: Mrs. McGirr (Sadie) of Detroit; Mrs. Percy Ledingham, (Sybil) of Welbeck; Howard on the home farm, Thos. on an adjacent farm, and Miss Myrtle at home. There are 12 grandchildren.

Mr. Lawrence was the last of his family. A brother Jno died 35 years ago, and another Thos. H. of Vickers 4 years ago. A half-brother, Mr. Sam Langrill, resides in Hanover, Mrs. Wm. Lawrence Sr. of town, now in her 88th year is an aunt of the deceased.

In religion he was an Anglican, and in politics a staunch Conservative. He was well versed in political history and reminiscences, and a most interesting raconteur. He was an ardent reader and kept himself well posted upon current events. Of a hearty, genial disposition, he was the soul of integrity and will be greatly missed by a wide circle of friends outside of the family connection. He never sought public life, but acted as sec'y-treas. of Hutton Hill school for a great many years. The funeral service will be conducted on Thursday at 2.00 p.m. by Rev. J. R. Thompson of Trinity church, and Rev. Mr. Halbert of Queen St. church. It will be private. Interment will be made in Durham cemetery.

MRS. JACOB KRESS

Contracting a cold while on a trip to Toronto three weeks ago, Mrs. Jacob Kress had since been ill at her home on Countess St., and died last Saturday morning, in her 76th year.

Mrs. Kress was formerly Margaret Rose, eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Rose of Durham. She was born in Lowell, Mass., and came to Durham in her youth with her parents and their family. Forty years ago she married the late Jacob Kress, who died 28 years ago, since when she has continued to live here with her children. To them were born two children, Harper of the Bank of Commerce, Owen Sound, and Maud, Mrs. Wilfred McDonnell, who with her husband and two sons have completed the home circle in recent years. Two brothers also survive, Wm. A. Rose of Chilliwack, B. C. and Hugh of Durham.

The funeral service on Monday afternoon was largely attended, and conducted by her pastor Rev. D. Gowdy. Interment was made in the Durham cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. C. Darling, Jas. Oakville Seniors Defeat Durham 7-1

Durham's Int. O.H.A. team met their first defeat this season in Walkerton Saturday night when they took on Oakville Seniors in an exhibition and went down 7-1. A crowd of nearly 800 witnessed the game and all were delighted with the clever hockey displayed, for despite the one-sided score, it was very interesting throughout. The "Villains," as Oakville team is named, were full value for their victory, and revealed hockey in its best. They had speed to burn, beautiful team play and more finish in their attacks on the nets. Superior speed and finish made the difference between the teams.

Durham came through winners at Arthur in a hard fought overtime contest the night previous, and this affected the staying power of the Durhams. However reinforced by Lem Trushinski of Walkerton on defence who played well, the locals put up a plucky battle, holding the fleet Villains to a 1-0 lead in 1st period, and to a 2-1 score in last when despite ganging attacks, Oakville could score but twice.

The second period was Oakville's best, when they ran in 4 straight, 2 on individual rushes by Allan brothers. No speedier skater or smoother stick artist than Percy Allen ever opposed a Durham team, and his brother is almost his equal. It is little wonder Chicago Hawks are endeavoring to sign the pair for professional hockey. Then Sonny Townsley, the little 120 lb. centre, is a stick-handling wizard, elusive and a great play-maker. Peer, the other first liner, is out through torn ligaments in shoulder, but Cassidy was a smooth substitute. Oakville is to be congratulated on playing their best team possible in an exhibition, playing a clean game and playing for every goal they could possibly score.

Durham had many scoring opportunities first two periods, but could not pierce a massed defence or Forder's net guard, and it was in 3rd frame that Dean on left wing took a pass from Raybould, and blazed the only local shot past Forder. Durham's best effort was early in last period, when they peppered the puck around the Villains' nets for 2 or 3 minutes, yet failed to score. Dean and E. Schutz were Durham's most effective players, though all played a sterling game. Referee Shearer of Walkerton penalized only one, Sutcliffe of Oakville.

Durham Poultry Ass'n Organized Last Week

Quite an enthusiastic gathering of Durham and vicinity poultry raisers gathered in the C.P.R. station last Wednesday night and organized "The Durham Poultry Association," its purpose being mainly an educational or training school for instruction in all matters pertaining to poultry, and a gathering where information will be shared among the members. No fee has yet been set, but it will be only a nominal one.

Officers elect are: President, C. E. Herrington; vice-pres. F. W. Thomas sec'y-treas., Eldon Weppeler; Directors, Walter Bayley, Harvey Voisin, Chas. Reay, Geo. Gray.

Meetings will be held the first and third Tuesdays of each month, and the next two—the February meetings—will be held in C.P.R. station. Next Tuesday, Feb. 5th, the diseases of adult poultry and chickens, will be discussed by Art. McDonald and C. E. Herrington. On Tuesday, Feb. 19th, the breeding of chickens, both pure breeds and utility birds, will be the subject.

All farmers and poultry raisers are welcome to attend these meetings and join the association. Much helpful information is to be derived. The Association aims to be educational; it is not organized for show purposes as yet, though such may come later.

Annual Meeting of Queen Street Congregation

The annual meeting of Queen St. United church was held Monday evening, Jan. 28th. The devotional program was conducted by the pastor Rev. R. G. Halbert, who occupied the chair for the evening. Mr. S. As this is the 60th anniversary of Queen St. church it being organized by the Union of the Wesleyan Methodist and the Methodist New Connection in 1874, it was decided to celebrate and a committee consisting of Messrs Glass, Aljoe, Chapman and Halbert and Mesdames Gagnon, Glass, Knechtel and Thomas to make necessary plans.

A resolution was presented and passed unanimously, asking for the repeal of the beer and wine amendment. Resolution to be sent to the member Mr. F. Oliver and the Premier.

The meeting was concluded with a social hour when refreshments were generously served by the ladies.
