### New Survey Of Britain

After five years of arduous labor a survey of England, Scotland and Wales is about to be made available by the London School of Economics. As described by The Morning Post it would be a veritable Domesday Book, except for the fact that it does not record the recent partition of big landed estates. Nevertheless, it is expected to contain information of the utmost value to the Ministry of Agriculture, the Forestry Commissioners and town and regional planning authorities. Some of the conclusions which have already emerged from the survey are curious: The post-war decline in arable farming has released large areas of relatively poor land, which, under present conditions, could be most profitably utilized for afforestation. Apart from obviously poor soils, the change from arable to pasture land has been greatest in the case of heavy soils, which, while capable of yielding good crops, are expensive to cultivate. Under the direction of country directors of education, more than 100,000 school children have taken part in the collection of information and the preliminary coloring of six-inch maps to show the uses to which land is put.

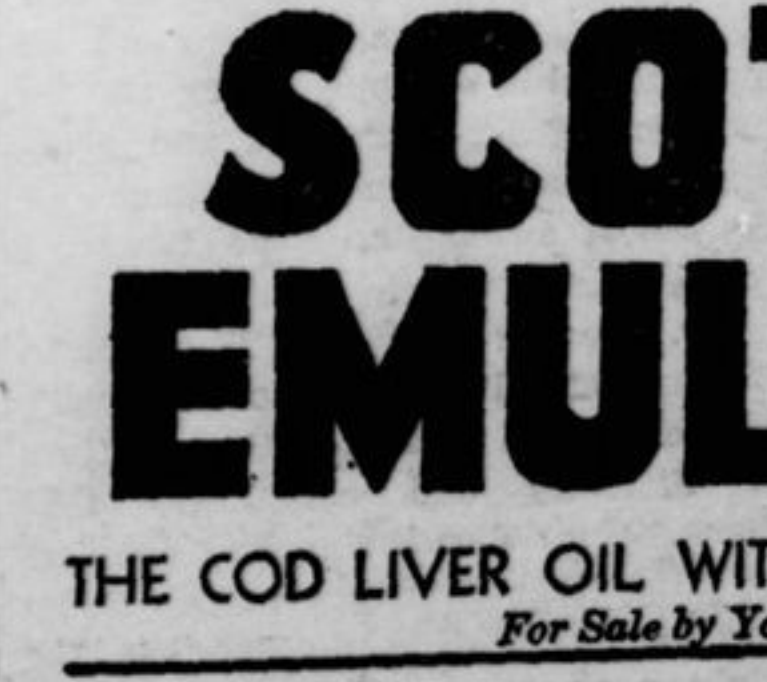

## SCOUTING Here There Everywhere

A brother to every other Scout, without regard to race or creed  
Charged with the guardianship of a large number of exhibits filling the Ridgeway, Ont. High School auditorium for the annual hobby show, Scouts slept in their own section, in their demonstration "camp" Friday night. Throughout Saturday they acted as guards and "floor walkers."

Port Elgin, Ont. Scouts are discussing the possibility of raising camp funds by the operation of a refreshment booth on the local bathing beach.

The 1st Guelph, Ont. Troop enjoyed a "commercial hike" through the heating plant of the Ontario Agricultural College, with Assistant Engineer Yates as guide and lecturer.

"Scouts in India," was the subject of an informative address by a returned missionary, the Rev. D. N. Rose, at the largely attended annual father and son banquet of the 7th Ottawa, He told of the organization of a troop of "criminal tribe" boys, and how through this means the "outcasts" were accepted as brother Scouts by boys of a high school troop.

Medals donated by Tom Mix, the movie star, will be listed among trophies competed for by Scouts at Toronto's Parkdale District Spring Circus and Handicraft Exhibition.

In return for use of the church hall, the Scout troop of St. James' Church, Guelph, cut and hauled wood for the church furnaces during the winter.

Reports presented at the annual meeting of the Waterloo County Scout Association recorded an increase during 1934 of 50 per cent membership in the South Waterloo district, which includes Galt, Preston and Hespeler. The annual Scout Toy Shop had supplied gifts for 250 children.

The 1st and 2nd Fort Erie, Ont., Scout troops are engaged in a waste paper collecting competition, the money going into their respective camp funds.

Thanks through the press to business men who donated prizes was not overlooked by the Scouts of Spurling, Man., following their highly successful ice carnival.

Scouts of Revelstoke, B.C., carried out a house-to-house canvass for old magazines and books for the men of the unemployment camps in that district.

Our newest Post Scout Troop (of physically handicapped boys) has been organized in the Shriners' Hospital, Winnipeg, by Rovers of the 31st (St. Giles') Winnipeg Crew. A three-column picture in the Winnipeg Free Press showed three boys, in bed, but smilingly happy after their investiture as Tenderfoot Scouts, illustrating the representative character of such Post Scout units, the three boys come from homes in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Ontario.

The rescue and first-aid treatment of a man found "half frozen" in a snow bank was the first aid stunt put on by the Wolves as a patrol number of the February monthly campfire of the 9th Winnipeg (First Presbyterian) Troop.

## THERE'S FLU IN THE AIR

Wise Precautions and Prompt Treatment May Keep You From This Disabling Affliction.

There are still many illnesses the causes of which remain unknown, writes a doctor. Throughout the world research is going on day after day in the hope that the cause and cure of these conditions may be discovered. One of these is influenza. But, although its actual cause remains a secret, there is now not the slightest doubt that it is due to a germ which is too small to be seen. It is so tiny that it can pass through a close filter which would stop the passages of many organisms.

Experiments have so far progressed that it is now only a matter of time for it to be possible to isolate this germ and probably produce an antidote. Meanwhile, we can only do what we can to prevent this disabling infection from leading to complications and to cut short its attacks as soon as we are able.

In the first place it is well to remember that influenza is infectious. It can be passed from one individual to another. Anything which tends to lower the powers of resistance makes it easier for infection to take place. Two factors seem to be worth considering; the first of these is fear. Although, at this season of the year there are usually in the air seeds of influenza, it is asking for trouble to go about in fear of catching it. When you are afraid, your general health suffers and you are less likely to resist infection. There is little to be afraid of if you do catch it. Provided treatment is prompt and your general health is good you stand an excellent chance of making an uninterrupted recovery. The second factor again concerns these same powers of resistance which are definitely lowered by the bad habit some people have acquired of setting out in the cold mornings of winter without any

Late nights, hot stuffy atmosphere and fatigue also lower resistance.
