

LIVESTOCK MARKET REPORT

Supplies of cattle were well in keeping with the present demand for Easter week, and on Monday the market opened active, and sales were made on a higher level. Choice heavy steers sold at from 7 1/2 to 8 cents, fair to good from 6 1/2 to 7 1/4; those

of medium quality at lower prices accordingly. Choice butcher cattle were in strong demand at from 6 1/2 to 6 3/4; fair to good from 5 1/2 to 6 cents. Choice baby beefs made from 7 1/2 to 7 3/4; fair to good from 6 to 7. The cow trade was active to stronger, a few top cows selling at 5 cents, but the bulk of the sales were made at from 4 to 4 1/4. Fat cows of fair to good quality made from 3 to 4. Canners and cutters 1 1/2 to 2 1/2. The bull trade has been slow to steady.

Supplies of lambs continue heavy for this season of the year, and the market has held steady. Choice lambs selling at 7 cents. The calf market was active and strong, the bulk of the best calves selling at from 7 to 8 cents.

The hog market has been slow and prices slightly lower owing to the limited outlet. Hogs sold on a basis of 7 1/2 to 8 cents f.o.b. and \$8.35 for truck deliveries.
