Expect Work On Two Highways in Grey This Summer

NORTH GREY M.P.P. SAYS NO. 6 WILL BE RESURFACED AND NO. 10 WIDENED

Speaking before Owen Sound Rotary Club on Monday, R. Patterson, M.P.P., for North Grey, intimated that it is almost certain No. 6 and 10 highway for four miles south of Owen Sound, as far as the cement pavement, will be re-surfaced this summer. It has been breaking up to some extent in recent months. The work of re-surfacing this four mile section will cost about \$45,000, the entire cost to be borne by the Highways Dept. under the new regulations whereby both the county and the city are not required to share in the cost of provincial high-ways.

Mr. Patterson also intimated that a recommendation had been made for doubling up the 10 ft. single strip portion of highway No. 10. There is a portion of highway No. 10. There is erton, which was laid only 10 feet wide. The Dept. has recommended that this portion of road be made full width. This will be a decided improvement for the single width has not proven very satisfactory and is regarded by many as very danger-ous.

While the Highway Dept. is not embarking on any large highway project this year these projects are regarded as very necessary and will likely be put through.

Durham's Population and Assessment Stationary

There are at present 1823 citizens of Durham, 2 less than last year, according to Assessor Scott's figures just compiled. Last year was the highest in the town's history.

The taxable assessment is \$659,700, a reduction of \$1400 from last year. \$1400 is about the assessment of the properties bought in by the town at the tax sale.

GOVERNMENT GRANTS FOR GREY AND BRUCE

The public accounts for Ontario show that \$1,809,513 was spent in connection with mothers' allowances of which \$29,985 came to Grey and \$20,958 to Bruce. In an expenditure of over three million dollars for old age pensions, \$115,758 came to Grey and \$93,276 to Bruce.

Total expenditure of the Dept. of Highways was \$14,342,958.96 of which \$1,462,846.61 was spent in Residency No. 5 (Engineer W. R. Alder's district). Total wages paid in No. 5 district was \$144,446.06.

Presbytery Votes to Ordain Women

GREY UNITED PRESBYTERY MEETS AT DURHAM

The Presbytery of Grey met in Knox Church, Durham on Tuesday, April 30th at 10 a.m. with the chair- man, Rev. G. W. Rose of Annan presiding. Between 70 and 80 min- isters and laymen were present. The main discussion at the morning ses- sion was on the remit from the Gen- eral Council re the ordination of women to the ministry. The argu- ments pro and con followed the us- ual lines and the final vote stood 32 in favor and 26 against. Some were doubtful and refrained from voting. The following resignations of charg- es were reported: Rev's C. B. Wool- ley of Shallow Lake and Hepworth; John Macdonald of Keady; James McLaughlan of Woodford and J. E. Peters of St. Vincent. A call in the usual form was received from Shallow Lake and Hepworth in fa- vor of Rev. W. J. Copey, Monticello. The call was accepted and order- ed forwarded to the settlement com- mittee for final action. Proton, which has been cared for by a stud- ent or retired minister, sent in a re- quest for a single ordained man and this was agreed to.

Rev. James McLaughlan, Wood- ford, took the devotional service and gave a fine, heartening message on Christ's promise "I, if I be lifted up, will draw all men unto me". There was discussion as to the possibility of adding Colpoys Bay to the Oxenden charge. The committee on rearrangement of boundaries is given authority to carry through the necessary negotiations. The same committee was instructed to visit the Maxwell field and report on the Providence church. The request that Shuldice might be connected with the Hepworth-Shallow Lake charge was granted. Consent was also given for the sale of the old church building at Bethel on the St. Vinc- ent charge.

Rev. E. W. Jewitt and Mr John McQuaker, Owen Sound, were nomi- nated as Grey Presbytery members on the Settlement com. for 1935-36.

The Secretary, Rev. J. Peters, of Meaford submitted his resignation but final action on it was deferred until the Presbytery meets during the Conference Session. The members expressed heartfelt appreciation of Mr. Peters for the value of his friendship and the efficiency of his service.

Rev. W. H. Smith, convener of missionary and maintenance commit- tee gave a resume of the plans be- ing formulated for the tenth anni- versary of church union, the celebra- tion in each church, in every con- ference and the great mass meeting to be held in the Maple Leaf Gar- dens, Toronto on Monday evening, June 10th. For this meeting there will be a national radio broadcast from 9 to 10 p.m. D.S.T. Mr Smith also gave a resume of the church's finances and plans for the special Thankoffering of \$250,000 for which the church is making appeal. He also outlined plans for meetings in the churches for missionary and stewardship education. All these plans were agreed to unanimously by the Presbytery.

The ladies of Knox Church provid- ed dinner and supper for the mem- bers and they were thanked for their kindness.

The fall meeting of the Presbytery will be held in Westside church in Owen Sound at a date to be decid- ed later.
