Mr. Thompson is an energetic young man, and is not only respected and esteemed by his own people but also by the people of other Christian communities, who will rejoice with us in his success.

On the evening of May the 17th, the A.Y.P.A. of his two churches, presented their Rector with an address and Hood, the latter being the symbol of his B.D. degree. Mr. Thompson wore the hood for the first time on Whit-Sunday, June 9.

With her bereaved husband, there mourn one son Harold R. of Owen Sound and one daughter Hattie, Mrs. Wm. Washburn of Wainwright, Alta. Two daughters, Cora and Anna both married, predeceased her. Mrs. Moffat was the last surviving member of her own family.

The funeral on Saturday in Owen Sound, was held from the residence of her son Harold, interment in Greenwood cemetery. It was attended by a large number of friends.
