#### AGRICULTURAL ATTRACTIONS

The Directors of the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies, at a meeting a few days ago, discussed at length attractions for fall.

It was agreed judging should be arranged to afford educational opportunities and be as attractive as possible. Suitable rings should be provided for all live stock and names of winners should appear on all exhibits.

Inter-community competitions were recommended, such as special prizes for Women's Institutes displays. Junior classes have been found to draw much interest and this year Agricultural Societies are sponsoring over 180 clubs for boys and girls.

In addition to the usual attractions the following were suggested, having been tried by Societies and requiring little cash outlay:

Antique displays.

Oxen demonstrations.

Hitching, driving and riding competitions.

Milk Maid contests.

Horse Drawing Competitions.

Classes for jumping horses.

Teams of horses, versus six or eight men.

Horse back wrestling.

Sheaf binding competitions.

Log sawing.

Log chopping.

Pota'o races.

Musical chairs—mounted.

Band competitions; Old time fiddlers' contests, etc.

Demonstrations of various kinds.
