ALMOST A LANDSLIDE

The result of the Provincial elections in New Brunswick last week was a sweeping victory for the Liberal Party. The vote—43 out of 48 seats—was so overwhelmingly one-sided, that it should leave no alibi as to why the Conservative party failed to make the grade. Premier Tilley (a son of one of the Confederation Fathers) and his entire cabinet were wiped out. With amazing calmness did Premier Bennett receive the news, and credit must be handed to him in facing a pending Dominion election as leader, in the face of such odds. He will sink and die with the ship.

THE PERILS OF MOTORING

The accident that overtook a Durham family on Sunday evening last, but emphasizes the need for cautious and sane driving. Especially on a holiday weekend, is the precaution more needed with heavy traffic both from south and north, as well as east and west. All chauffeurs should take it into themselves "Am I my brother's Keeper?" and err on the side of safety. The traffic over holiday periods has become a problem to handle and the other fellow as well as oneself has to be considered, to allow for a minimum of accidents. The citizens feel for the McDonald family in their bereavement, and injuries suffered. When we start out in the morning, we little realize where we will land before night comes upon us. There are many more ways in this 20th century, to meet death than there were 100 years ago, but meanwhile science has advanced to check disease.

One Year under Liberal Govt.

Toronto, July 3/35. On July 13th the Hepburn government will be able to look back on one year of office. It has been a year of achievement and promise. When the newly-elected premier and his cabinet took over the reins of office on that midsummer's day in 1934, the citizens of Ontario looked for the carrying out of campaign pledges. They were not disappointed. Not in one instance has the Liberal administration failed to implement the promises made to an electorate tired and disgusted with the actions of the Conservative party.

After the first three months of Liberal rule, cynics expressed the view that it was just a case of "new brooms sweeping clean." Others decided to wait before expressing a definite opinion on the calibre of the youthful Prime Minister and his colleagues. They wanted to see just how long it would take for the Liberal government to develop amnesia with regard to some of the planks in the party platform. But there has been no forgetfulness.

They have seen one year of achievement and they are convinced that it is no flash in the pan. Expenditures have been rigidly curtailed without harmful effect on the departmental services, numerous economies have been effected in every phase of government operation, the costs of financial operations have been cut heavily, there has been a weeding out of the incompetent and unfit from departments and there has been a general shake-up which has resulted in tremendous benefit to the province. Interest rates have been lowered to a reasonable point and defaulting municipalities have been taken in hand and competently administered.

In one department of government alone, perhaps the most important branch of operations, that of welfare and relief, the Liberal regime has saved the taxpayers of Ontario enormous sums through the creation of an efficient system of relief administration. When the new government took office, the relief system was found to be a hodge-podge. In fact it was anything but a system. But that has been changed now. Today welfare authorities from all parts of the continent are looking at Ontario and holding up the provincial system as a model for others to emulate.

The provincial Hydro system has been safeguarded by vigorous steps, and the power consumers of Ontario have every reason to be thankful to a government that did not hesitate to act quickly and with wisdom in the face of a grave crisis. The story of hydro has not yet been completed, but the Hepburn government will write the concluding chapters in the same reasonable manner that they have written the beginning. The T. and N. O. Railway, the provincial air service, the Workmen's Compensation Board and other provincial bodies have been placed upon a practical, orderly basis.

All this has taken place in one year. The next year is bright with promise and with a continuation of sound business methods, the government and the citizens will see either rising out of chaos.
