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**THE ROLL CALL**  
**ALEX C. MCGILLIVRAY**  
 Although just ten days ago he came through the ordeal of an operation for hernia in excellent form for one of his years, very shortly after it became apparent that the shock to his system would be too great and that he could not survive it. The end came on Sunday morning less than six days after the operation.  
 The passing of Mr. McGillivray removes one who enjoyed as large a measure of personal popularity among the citizens of our community as any other individual who could be named. He was known to everyone, and was on particularly intimate terms of friendship with old time families of the village and district, but the greeting that roused his most cordial response was that which was extended in the Gaelic tongue. His home had latterly become the centre at which numerous friends called to pass the time in a companionable way, sometimes in groups, when there would be a lively exchange of good-natured quips. In religion he was a Baptist, and in politics, a Liberal.  
 Born 84 years ago in King town-

ship, York county, Alex C. McGillivray came with his parents the late Mr and Mrs Hugh McGillivray who bought the farm on 20th con of Greenock, which later became the property of the subject of this sketch. For quite a number of years he had been residing in Paisley. He was the last of a family of seven brothers and sisters, and had spent his whole life here since boyhood.  
 The funeral was held from his late residence on Tuesday afternoon, and was very largely attended. Services were conducted by Mr. Baisdon, pastor of the Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. L. Mason, former pastor here, but now of Strathroy, and Rev. A. J. McGillivray, Guelph, a cousin of deceased. At the graveside the brethren of Abiram Lodge, I.O.O.F. took charge, the deceased having been a veteran member of that lodge. Pallbearers were Messrs Duncan McGillivray, W. Wrightson, and D. Forrester.  
 Among those here from a distance were Mrs M. McKinnon, Mr Angus McKinnon and Miss Sadie McKinnon of Toronto; Dr. and Mrs Malcolm J. McKinnon of Rochester, N. R.—Paisley Advocate.

**NEW POLITICAL PARTY FOR CANADA**

Startling news came in Monday daily papers that Hon. H. H. Stevens will form a candidate of his party, having a constituency in Canada, at the next Dominion election. It was no secret that the present Premier and his cabinet minister did not see eye to eye in political policies. The break came to such dimensions that Hon. Mr. Stevens resigned his cabinet position though still a Conservative member. Since his resignation some time ago, Mr. Stevens has had up to 20,000 letters from all ranks of citizens, asking him not to help but to injure the outlook of both old political parties, not to speak of third parties such as the C.C.F., U.F.O. and U.F.A., etc.

Mr. Stevens has been much in the limelight as a result of his "price spreads" examinations, and here he got a glimpse of how the underdog lives. Always sympathetic to this cause, the investigation but increased his desire to help the rights of the forgotten man. Now with encouragement from many backers, he is taking the final plunge that may land him in the seats of the mighty.  
 The statement from him that he will place a candidate in every riding makes the situation complicated, to say the least. Especially in Grey-Bruce, where there are at present three official candidatures, will the situation become tense. Some see in this new party more of a death-blow to Liberal hopes than to Conservative. What it would do in this riding would be rash guessing.

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**Priceville and Holstein Given Cheaper Hydro Rates**

Last week the Ontario Hydro Commission announced arrangements to ease overly heavy power costs burdening a half dozen villages, three of which are in South Grey—Priceville, Holstein and Neustadt. In these three villages, a resulting sharp reduction in original domestic and commercial rates is forecast.

In general the affected municipalities had built up heavy-powered Hydro plants to feed some large local industry. When the industry collapsed, it was explained that the local consumers were saddled with Hydro equipment far beyond their purses. As a result they fell behind in their payments to Ontario Hydro.

The Commission Chairman, T. S. Lyon, announced, had worked out a settlement. This, he explained will relieve these places of part of the charges incurred by the Commission when the heavy equipment was installed.

"The result of the rearrangement of capital and capital charges," the Commission Chairman said, "is that they will be placed in the position of paying for future power in full." Expense of the settlement, Mr. Lyon said, will be carried by the system. The relief of the overburdened Hydro municipalities is carried through under amendments passed for this purpose at the last session of the Legislature.  
 The mentioned rate cuts will affect both domestic and commercial bills. It was stated that the Commission, generally speaking, was seeking to have no domestic rates in the contract municipalities running over 6 cents.

**W. R. McCamus** Principal of the Walkerton High School for the past eleven years, has resigned, to accept a position as teacher of Latin and Greek in the classical department of St. Catherine's Collegiate, at a salary of \$3,000, which is \$300 more than he received at Walkerton.

**Markdale Store Burglarized.**  
 Between midnight Sunday and Monday morning, F. T. Hill & Co's general store at Markdale, was entered by burglars and goods to the value of over \$200 stolen, which included several suits of clothes, several suits of shoes, a couple of rifles, some ammunition and several other articles. A hole was cut through a panel in a door, permitting one of the party to put his hand through and unlock it. Provincial police are making an investigation.
