OBITUARY

MRS. LYDIA FERGUSON

In the town of Mount Forest on July 5th, there passed away at the ripe old age of 90 years at her residence lot 1, Durham St., Mrs Lydia Ferguson who for the past 15 years has resided there with the exception of 4 years when she lived on Gore A. con. 7, Egremont, with her son, Dougal, until his death in the fall of 1926 and also, some of the winter months at irregular periods, since which she spent at her daughters, Mrs McKinnon's, Priceville and Mrs Watson's, Egremont.

She enjoyed unusual good health in her declining years, until last November when she fell on the floor of her house, breaking her wrist, from which she never fully recovered. After being in the hospital for a month she was taken to her daughter, Mrs. Watson's, where she remained, until about a month ago when she and her daughter, returned to her own home, where she was making apparent recovery, until she was stricken with paralysis and passed away in a few hours.

In religion she was a "Disciple of Christ", her husband being a pioneer preacher of that church in the 60's in the township of Proton, con. 18, and in Priceville where they conducted services from house to house, and later in a little frame church for many years.

She was born on the Island of Islay, Scotland, in 1845, coming to Canada at the age of 4 years, with her parents, Alexander Ferguson and Catherine McLean, who located in the township of Minto, 5 miles south west of Harriston. At the age of 17 she was united in marriage to Daniel Ferguson, son of Donald Ferguson and Sarah Ferguson, also from Islay, Scotland who located in Proton Township, con. 18. She and her husband lived on the 18th con, Proton, the greater part of their married life, removing to the township of Egremont 45 years ago, to lot 27, con. 21 where her husband passed away 41 years ago.

To this union were born fourteen children, 11 sons and 3 daughters. Two sons died in infancy, the rest saw mature years, but through the years the grim Reaper has taken his toll and today but 4 sons and 2 daughters remain to mourn the loss of a loving mother. The sons are John A., on the 12th con., Egremont; Chas. D. also of Egremont; Daniel and Archibald F., at Beauty Sask.; and daughters: Mrs. Farquhar McKinnon of Priceville, (Sarah Jane), and Mrs. Thomas Watson (Catherine) in Egremont. We also find as we view the many branches of the family tree that there are 59 grandchildren and 36 great grandchildren. She also leaves to mourn one sister, 2 years younger in California.

The funeral was held from the home to McEachnie's cemetery, 1/2 mile west of Priceville where she was laid to rest beside her husband in the old family plot. The service was held at the house and grave by the Rev. Mr. Millar, Mt. Forest, and was largely attended by sympathetic neighbors and friends and sorrowing relatives. He took for his text, verses 1 and 2 of the 12th chapter of Hebrews and delivered a very impressive, hopeful and sympathetic discourse.
