At the farm home near Mantowaning, Manitowling Island, Ont., an old resident of Durham died on June 25 in the person of John McKinnon, born in 1852 at Bunness five miles east of Durham. He was married in 1882 to Annie Cameron also of Glenelg. He resided in Durham for thirteen years, moving to Manitowling Island in 1895. He purchased a large farm and went into raising livestock. Mrs. McKinnon died in 1926. Of a family of seven, only one son survives, Cameron at home on the farm.

## Kathleen Stokes to be In Durham on Sunday

As one of the early daughters of Durham, Kathleen Stokes, the famous radio, pipe organ artist, will be in Durham Sunday evening next, when she will be at the pipe organ in Knox United Church. This is a great privilege to hear the continent-wide radio artist.

Kathleen Stokes was born in Durham, known at that date as Kathleen O'Connor, her father being an electrician. At an early age, the family removed to Thorold, where Kathleen was educated. From even youthful days, she was regarded as a child prodigy in music, and her later training at St. Joseph's College Toronto, made her a gold medalist. Since that date she has devoted her whole life to pipe organ work, and is known from coast to coast, for her wonderful broadcasts from Shea's theatre. This past year she organized a ladies' band which travelled with great acceptance in the leading cities of America.

Kathleen Stokes will tender an organ number during the evening service at Knox Church Sunday night, as well as give a half hour recital at the close of service.

Rev. John Bell, Brandon, a son of the congregation, will have charge of the evening service, and the pastor, Rev. W. H. Smith, in the morning.

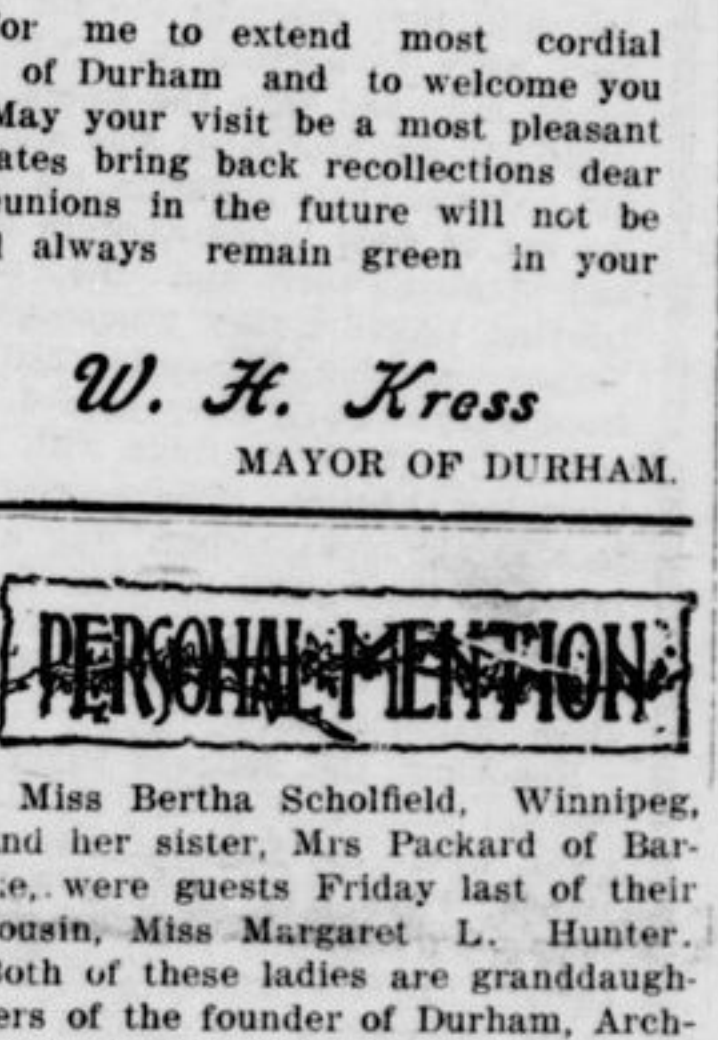
## BE SURE TO REGISTER

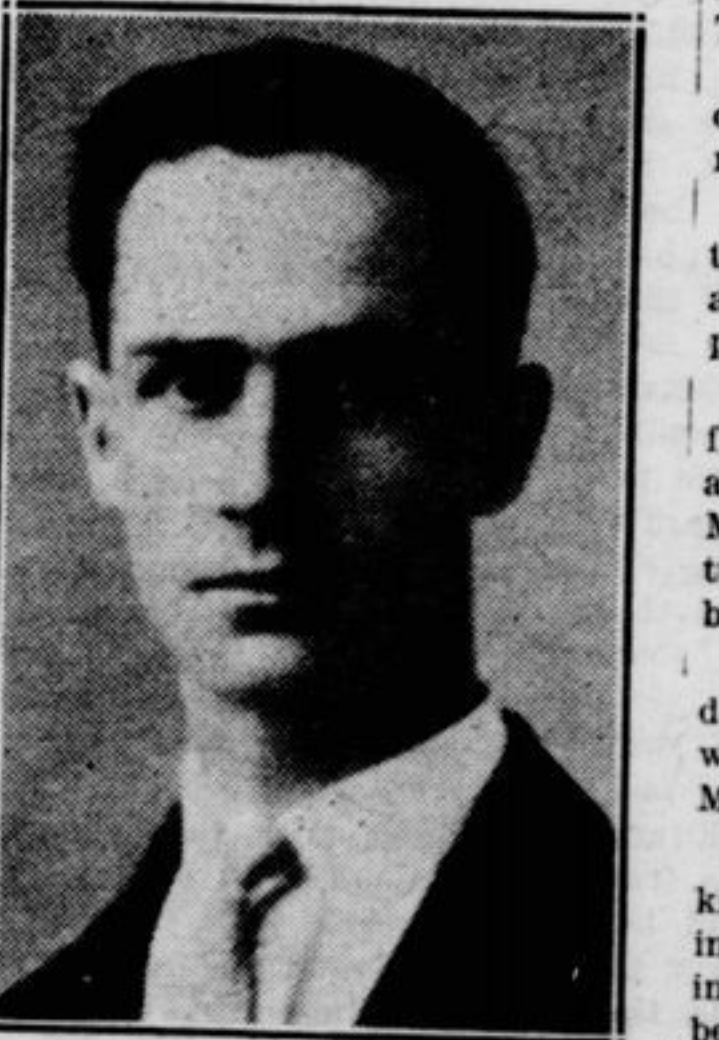
## Reunion Notes

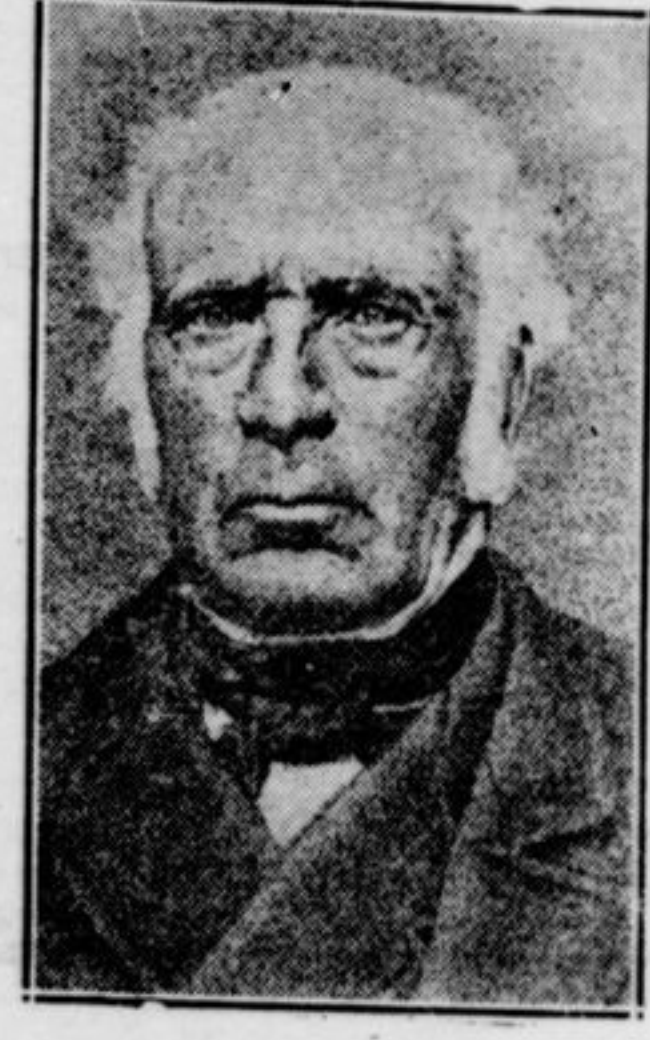
