Mrs John Vessie, St. Marys, is spending a few days with her mother-in-law, Mrs. John Vessie.

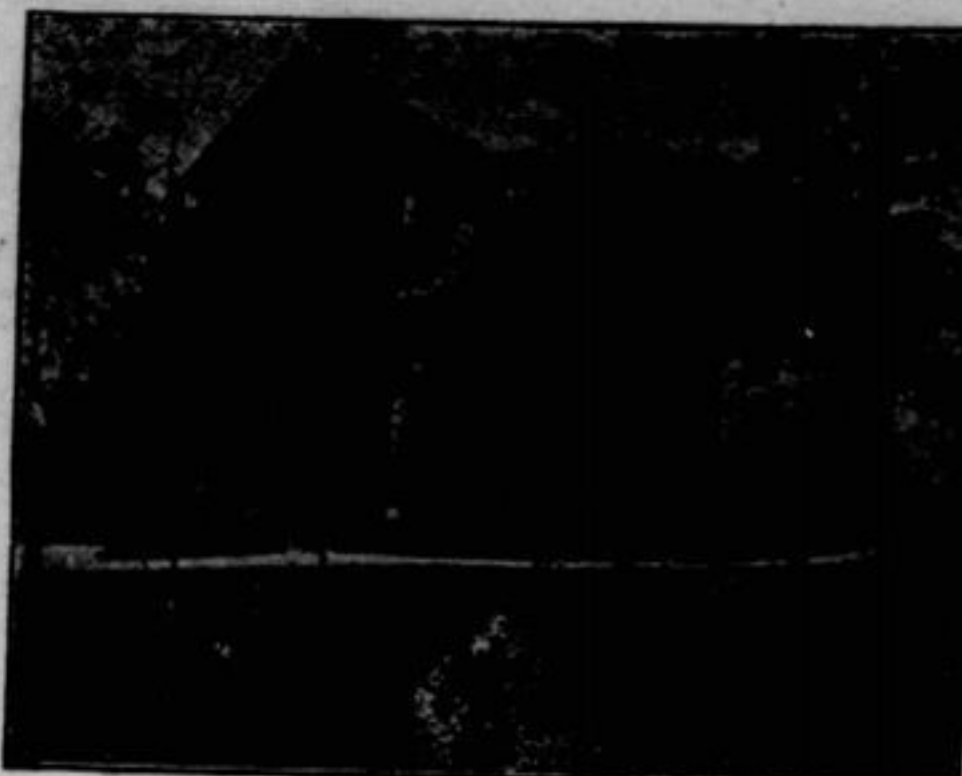

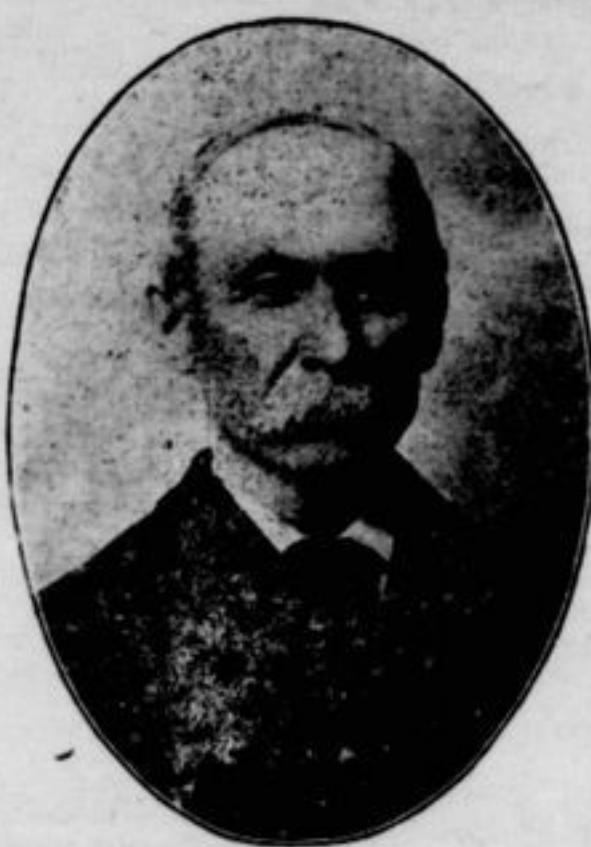

**To Mark 50th Anniversary
Of Bentinck Baptist Church**

On April 2, 1875, the Bentinck Baptist church was organized with a membership of eight. In January 1876 this little Gaelic church was united with another neighboring Baptist church, the total membership then being twenty-two. Of these charter members two survive: Mr. Alex McGillivray of Chatsworth and Mrs John A. McDonald of Westhope, N.D. In 1877 the present church building was erected at Mulock.

During all these years the little church has served the community well under faithful services. A flourishing Sunday School and B.Y.P.U., as well as an active Ladies' Aid are all marks of its force for good in the community which it serves.

The church is celebrating its sixtieth anniversary on Sunday August 11, and the members are looking forward to welcoming many non resident members and friends. Services will be held at 11 a.m., 2.30 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. The speaker at the morning and evening services will be Rev. John Galloway of Huntsville, a former pastor of Huntsville, who will speak at afternoon service. Rev. H. Crickington of Dixville, Que., also a former pastor will be present.

Since the services are bordering on Durham Old Home Week, it is hoped that the Old Boys and Girls will pay a visit to "The Little White Church on the Hill."

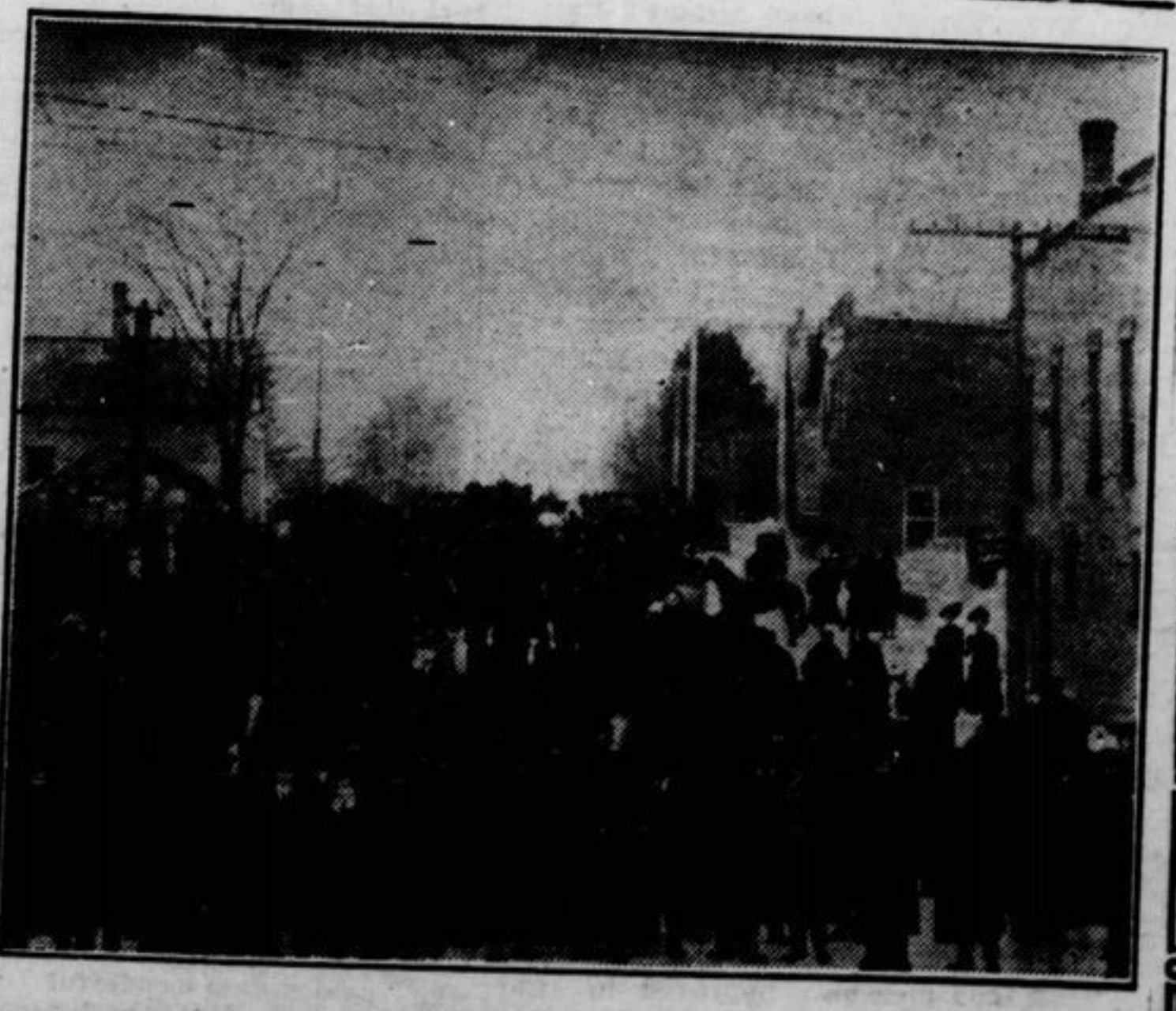
