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Seeing Toronto

A trip to Toronto may be quite a commonplace event for most citizens of Durham and vicinity but last week a Review representative made the trip and found it interesting and pleasurable from several new angles.

This city was selected this year for the annual convention of the Canadian Newspaper Association, which brought together about two hundred newspapermen from all parts of Canada, through the courtesy of the two railroads. Business sessions were held on each of the three mornings of the Convention, in the Royal York Hotel, leaving the afternoons free for entertainment of the visiting editors and their ladies.

On the opening morning the delegates were welcomed by Premier Heppburn and by Mayor James Simpson both of whom in their greetings, acknowledged the important place weekly newspapers occupied in the life of the country. During each business session of the program, very profitable addresses on various phases of newspaper work were delivered by expert men in the business as well as by such prominent men as Thos. Bradshaw, Canada's leading authority on municipal affairs, and Col. Chappell of the Public Relations Dept. of General Motors of Canada. At one of the noon luncheons, the members of the "fourth estate" were made much happier by a prince of story-tellers, Gregory Clark of the Star Weekly, who spoke while his side-kick, Jim Frise fascinated the audience with his cartoon work. Incidentally Mr. Clark informed the Review he would be unable to attend the Old Boys Reunion in Durham though he expected his father, Joseph Clark, one time printer's devil on the Review and now editor of the Toronto Daily Star would be on hand.

Entertainment features included a boat and motor coach trip to Niagara Falls, especially enjoyed by visitors from Eastern and Western Canada, a motor drive around Toronto by courtesy of the Kiwanis Clubs of Toronto, a boat trip to view Toronto harbor developments as guests of the city of Toronto, an afternoon tea at Royal Canadian Yacht Club as guests of the Toronto Star, supper dance at the Royal York Hotel and special parties to theatre, museum, or Art Gallery. This part of the program was a most informative one as well as proving very pleasant in a social way, bringing together residents of widely scattered towns of Canada in a friendly sort of manner that tends to a better understanding among the peoples of this great nation.
