The Durham Review A. S. Switzer Dies in Toronto After Lengthy Illness

ALFRED SECORD SWITZER Passing away suddenly at Grace Hospital in Toronto last Tuesday morning at 3.45 o'clock came as a great shock to his many friends in this vicinity as well as in Toronto. He was the youngest son of Mrs. B. J. Switzer of Hanover and the late Mr. Switzer who passed away just three years ago. He would have been 43 years of age on October 20. On March the 4th last, he suffered a fall on the ice while working, since that time being unable to work. Through the fall he sustained an injury to his arm, the fragments being torn and also broke the fifth dorsal of the lumbar vertebrae, several x-rays being taken before the trouble could be located. An operation was performed Thursday, Aug. 8th, which consisted of eight inches of shin bone from each leg being removed and grafted onto the spine. The operation seemed to be very successful and word was received by his people that he was progressing nicely, but his heart failed him and the immediate cause of his passing. His wife had been with him until 10.45 p.m. and had not long been home when word came to hurry to the hospital as she was needed there but before her arrival his spirit had taken its flight.

Deceased was born at the Switzer homestead on the Durham Road two miles east of Hanover where he grew to manhood. He enlisted for overseas service with the 147th Grey Battalion in 1915 and served as a runner in France until Aug. 1918, when he was badly gassed and sent to hospital in France. He never fully recovered from the effects of the gas.

He was married on June 16th, 1920 to Susie E. Adlam, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Adlam, now of Durham. They took up residence in Toronto at the time of their marriage, which has since been their home. Besides his sorrowing wife, he is survived by his two sons, Clarence Second, aged 14, Alfred Wellington, aged 11, also his mother in Hanover, four sisters and three brothers, Mrs. A. C. Augustinus (Mary), Hanover; Mrs. Joe Curtis (Louisa) Revelstoke, B.C.; Mrs. Charles Metcalfe (Emma), Manor, Sask.; Mrs. Howard Allen (Edith), Owen Sound; Benjamin D., Revelstoke, B.C.; William J. on the old homestead and Harvey in Edson, Alta. Two sisters Laura and Mrs. Wilson Hillis (Margaret), deceased.

The funeral services were conducted in Britten Memorial (Spiritualist) Church, Toronto, by his pastor, the Rev. M. S. McGuire, under Boy Scout Honors, a solo being rendered by Mrs. Leslie Price; thence to his home at 97 Silverthorn Ave., then by motor to the Durham Anglican church where the service was taken over by Rev. W. A. Allison, assisted by Rev. Cooper, of Hanover, in the absence of Rev. J. R. Thompson, being under military and Orange honors. The pallbearers were one brother and seven brother-in-laws: Wm. Switzer, Adrian Augustinus, Howard Allen, Geo. Adlam, C. Adlam, Fred Torry, Edgar Fursman and Wilson Hillis.

The flower bearers were his Orange brethren. This party is one of many from Canadian universities that visited Great Britain this year under the auspices of the Overseas Education League by the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain.
